SUMMARY NEWS.

Dominion.
Toronto bakers are increasing the price of bread.

A party has left Woodstock to search for gold on the Tobique.
Sheriff Freese, of Kings county, N. B. has appointed his son, Fred W., his deputy.

The ship Equator, of Chester, Eng., is a total wreck at Petit Miravies, N. S., near Yarmouth.

Theodore Cav, aged 22, of Stanhope, P. E. Island, was drowned from a dory on Thursday.

The two men reported missing from the Nova Scotia schooner Oddfellow, have reached Halifax.

Robert Walker and his son, aged 25, were drowned while crossing the Grand River, ten miles from London, Ont.

Fabian Richard, for half a century light house keeper at Richibucto Cape, died a few days ago, aged eighty-five years.

Frank A. Sharpe, lately in the employ of S. McMillan & Co., St. John, is about to open a drug store at Port Elgin, Westmorland county.

Messrs. Milne, Coultas & Co., St. George have received a contract for granite monument to be erected at Kingston, Ont., in memory of Sir John A. Macdonald.

A miscreant struck with an axe a cow owned by Joseph Johnson, of Greenwick Kings county. The blow nearly severed the back bone and the animal died in great agony.

Nova Scotia fishing schooner Oddfellow arrived at Canso Wednesday. The captain reported that a dory containing two men was lost in the fog thirty miles from Liscombe.

Increased business has necessitated the erection of a large building for the use of the Sussex foundry. The old building will be torn down shortly. Stone and lumber is now being hauled for the new building.

John McQuade, a St. John butcher, was gored by an angry bull in the barn of James Stack, Richmond street, Wednesday. Three ribs were broken and his thigh badly bruised. Dr. Harrison attended him.

Between thirty five and forty elevators are to be erected at points on the C. P. R. in Manitoba, and there are to be others erected along the Northern Pacific and Manitoba Northwestern, besides two in Winnipeg.

Some six thousand seal skins, says a British Columbia despatch, is the total catch of the Northern Pacific spring fleet. The sealers shelly, and because their arms were not loaded, had reached Victoria. The captain of the American ship Corwin was not aware of the present regulations when the seizure was made.

Robt. Dryden, who has resided in California for 25 years, and during that time has been engaged in gold mining has returned to his native province.

Believes that gold exists in paying quantities at Ft. Wolf, Albert county, and so sure is he of the fact that he will invest considerable money in the developing of the mines.

One of the largest funerals seen at Richibucto for a long time took place on Wednesday, when the remains of Mamie, eldest daughter of Geo. V. McInerney, M. P., were interred in the Catholic cemetery. The procession was headed by two hundred school mates of the deceased. Six of the school boys acted as pall-bearers. Mr. McInerney, of St. John, was one of the mourners.

THE BAY ROUTE.—The Bay of Fundy Steamship Company is understood to have been sold out to the Dominion Atlantic Railway Company, operating between Yarmouth, Annapolis and Halifax.

The reported sale is denied here, and it is said the Dominion Atlantic people have purchased a new boat shortly and it is not likely there will be any competition to the Dominion Atlantic when it appears as the manager of a bay steamer.—Globe.

RECEIVING THEIR PENSIONS AGAIN.—A couple of years ago the United States Congress passed a law the effect of which was to deprive persons living outside of the country from receiving pensions to which they were entitled because of services rendered by themselves or relatives in the civil war. Some persons who depended largely on their pension allowance were obliged to move to the States. The payment of the pensions of those who remained in Canada and other countries was dropped. As a result of recent legislation, however, payment of the pensions has again commenced, and the amount held back has been paid. One person in St. John received \$400 in back pay; two others received about \$200 each.—Globe.

British-Unionist Foreigners.
Liberal-Unionist parliamentary candidates have been warned by the leaders not to leave the country during June, as an election within the month is imminent.

Fifty persons were killed and 150 seriously injured by an earthquake on Saturday, which raged Paranythia, Turkey. The total number of shocks was 24.

Brasilian freebooters the other day captured a French settler and robbed others on the French Guiana frontier. When a despatch boat was sent to remove order Central, the leader of the freebooters, fired upon the Frenchmen. A conflict ensued, sixty freebooters being killed and five Frenchmen, including their leader. Trouble may ensue.
