Payson Weston's walk across the continent in 165 days shows the better side of the athlete. Mr. Weston is over seventy years of age. He made his walk without the stimulus of a bet or a prize, or even of a competitor. He did not seek a track where the condition of speed would be perfect, and where he could grind out the 40 miles a day which he proposed, and never even grow tired. Rather he took the country roads, and for a large part of the way in the far west he was obliged to walk the railway sleepers. He persisted through days of almost steady rain, wading through mud and overcoming all kinds of impediments. Mr. Weston had no cheering crowd to, applaud his century scores.
