LT.-COL. GUTHRIE HONORED AT NEWCASTLE

Freedom of the Town conferred on him—Addresses fine Recruiting meetings and organizes Ladies' Committee.

Newcastle Jan. 29.—The remains of late Geo. S. Stoddart of Stoddart Mercantile Co., were laid to rest in Miramichi cemetery yesterday afternoon. Many floral tributes were sent by loving friends. Rev. S. J. MacArthur conducted services. The pallbearers were Geo. Stables, J. D. Creighton, J. H. Phinney, W. A. McMaster, John Clark and S. W. Crocker.

There was a great recruiting meeting in town hall last night, addressed by Lt.-Col. Percy A. Guthrie and others. One recruit offered and there are prospects of more as a result of the meeting.

In the afternoon an influential deputation of citizens met Col. Guthrie at the station. They were accompanied by Lt.-Col. Meserereau and the whole effective force of C Company of the 132nd Battalion.

In the evening the chair was taken by C. E. Fish. Speeches intensely patriotic and eulogistic of Col. Guthrie and his thousands of brave Canadian comrades were delivered by the chairman, Hon. John P. Burchill, Hon. Donald Morrison, Ex-Mayor C. J. Morrissey and Col. Meserereau. Ald. McGrath on behalf of the Mayor and Council and citizens welcomed Col. Guthrie and offered him the freedom of the town.

Col. Meserereau said he wanted to have a temperate battalion. A soldier could not be efficient unless temperate. And he wanted a God-fearing battalion—a band that could not make a good soldier.

Col. Guthrie, the last speaker, received a magnificent ovation. He spoke for about an hour, holding his audience spellbound as he told of the causes of the war, of the war itself and of the danger we were in unless recruits poured in to relieve the weary men at the front.

After the first meeting he addressed the ladies and organized a branch of the Women's Recruiting Committee with following officers:

SPLENDID WORK BY RED CROSS SOCIETY OF KNOXFORD, CARLETON CO.

Report of Red Cross Society of Knoxford, Carleton county, from December 1914 to December 1915.
The Belgian Relief—Red Cross Society of Knoxford was organized December 31st, 1914, with 12 members, and gradually increased to 24. (One member, Mrs. L. N. Beckwith, died in March, 1915). President, Mrs. Emma Traford; vice-president, Mrs. Allen Margison; and sec.-treas., Mrs. Wilmet Margison.

The need of immediate help for the Belgians aroused interest and contributions of money and materials enabled the society to add to the relief committee through G. Ernest Barbour, of St. John, N. B., 1 box and 2 barrels of goods, which included thirteen quilts, serviceable, warm, second hand and much new, clothing for both sexes and all ages.

In April, 1915, it was decided to attend to Red Cross work. Since then 6 boxes have been shipped, containing 125 pairs of socks, 3 quilts, 26 pyjama suits, 22 night shirts, 8 bed jackets, all of good cutting, and 6 do. and 10 handkerchiefs, besides a quantity of writing material. (Another box is nearly ready for shipment) 20 pairs of socks were sent to Woodstock July 12, 1915, and \$15 to Lady Tilley in St. John, N. B.; in October, 1915, for Patriotic Fund, sources of Red Cross funds are as follows: Amount from dues, contributions and visitors, \$65.24; three public suppers, \$71.85; results of collecting trips through Knoxford by Mrs. David Kilpatrick and Mrs. Edner Reid, which amount included \$1.00 each donated by members of society, \$46.20. (List of donors too long to print, but copied in secretary-treasurer's book).

From quilt made by Mrs. David Kilpatrick and Mrs. Byron Lord, and sold by ticket, \$8.95. Donated by Clark A. McBride from gramophone concert, \$2.30. Total amount raised, \$197.50. Total expenditures, \$156.07. Balance on hand Dec. 31, '15, \$41.52.

The Red Cross work was sent to Miss Clements, 223 Germain street, St. John, N. B.

The society would also like to very gratefully acknowledge donations of socks, yarn and work. Much knitting has been done by elderly women, some young mothers and others who cannot attend the meetings.

Mrs. Edmund Longstaff gave 1 lb. yarn and 1 pair socks. Mrs. Lambert Wiggins, of Miramichi, N. B., 1 pair socks and Mrs. L. O. Woolverton, Mrs. Evelyn Carlisle, Mrs. Robinson Longstaff, one pair socks each. Of Red Cross yarn there have been knit by Mrs. John Reid 12 pairs; Mrs. Jack Bowater, 9 pairs; Miss Minnie Kelly, 2 pairs; Mrs. A. Van Dine, Miss Nettie Longstaff, Mrs. Leonard Bartley, Mrs. Wellington Jamieson, of Vancouver, B. C.; Miss Vera Reid, Miss Ida Kilpatrick and Miss Alice Trafford, 1 pair each.

Of socks knit by members, in addition to sewing and very regular attendance: Mrs. Chas. Margison has knit 25 pairs since April; Mrs. Jas. Reid, 12 pairs, and others several pairs each.

Extracts from the "Saint John City Assessment Act, 1909."
"Sec. 32. The Assessors shall ascertain, as nearly as possible, the particulars of the real estate, the personal property, and the income of any person, who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission."

"Sec. 43. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with the Assessors the statement under oath within the time required; nor shall the Common Council, in any such case, sustain an appeal from the judgment of the Assessors, unless they shall be satisfied that there was good cause why the statement was not filed in due time as herein provided."
