Petrograd, Sept. 13.—M. Skobelev, minister of labor, announced today that General Korniloff's adventure had collapsed, and that the army at his headquarters has surrendered.

Was Willing.
London, Sept. 13.—General Korniloff, former commander-in-chief of the Russian army and leader of the rebellion against the provisional government, has expressed a willingness to surrender on certain terms, says a despatch from Petrograd to the Exchange Telegraph Company. The provisional government demands his unconditional surrender.

Collision Not Likely.

Petrograd, Sept. 13.—According to an official statement just issued, Korniloff's attempt seems to have collapsed and there is no longer any reason to fear a collision between the two forces. After General Alexieff had been in communication by telephone with General Korniloff, the opinion was that the revolutionary general later would abandon his enterprises.

Stockholm, Sept. 13.—The Svenska Dagbladet announces that it has received a despatch from Petrograd stating that the Premier Kerensky has left the Russian capital at the head of an army in order to meet the forces of General Korniloff before they reach the capital. There was every indication, the message said, that a battle would be fought on Wednesday.

Only One Solid.

Petrograd, Sept. 13.—The so-called "Savage" division, composed of Georgians and Caucasians, is the only unit of troops sent against Petrograd which remains solid for General Korniloff.

EVERY GERMAN
SHOP WRECKED
BY THE MOBWild Disorders Prevailed All
Night in Buenos Ayres—
Germany Notified Her Min-
ister Persona Non Grata.

Buenos Ayres, Sept. 13.—The rioting which began here late yesterday in an anti-German demonstration, continued throughout the night. Every German business house and restaurant in the downtown district was wrecked. The German Club and other buildings were damaged seriously by fire. The police wounded seven rioters seriously when they fired into the crowd. Three of the injured are expected to die.

At first the crowds were so unmanageable that the police closed all the streets leading to the German legation and consulate. The archives in these buildings were taken to the storage vaults for safe keeping. Firemen armed with rifles prevented the mob from destroying the offices of the German Trans-Atlantic Company, which supplies the city's light. Heavy forces of provincial troops are guarding the railway over which German Minister Luxburg will arrive this morning.

The Argentine foreign minister at midnight made public the following announcement: "The government has proved the texts of the Luxburg telegram and in consequence has sent the following to Berlin: 'Argentine minister, please deliver to the German government the following: The Argentine government has recognized and values highly the exalted manner in which the government of Germany has solved in simple terms all the Argentine claims, but must inform the German government that because of the texts of Minister Luxburg's telegram which

The government will not be a coalition one, he added, inasmuch as its existence will not depend upon an inter-party agreement. He said M. Piechowski, the minister of food and supplies, will resign, as also will M. Savinkov, the assistant minister of war. He indicated that a change in the minister of foreign affairs was also probable.

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IS UP TO CANADA
SAYS COL. CURRIEIf Canadians Have to Yield an
Inch in France They Will
Say "Those at Home De-
serted Us."

Toronto, Sept. 13.—"If we have to yield one inch of the Canadian front that has cost so much to claim, our men out there will have but one answer, for they will say that those at home have deserted us."

This message was sent by General Sir Arthur Currie, commander-in-chief of the Canadians in France, to the Canadian people through Lieut. Col. Cecil G. Williams, formerly chief recruiting officer for Canada.

A GENERAL
REDUCTION
IN FLOURAll Spring Wheat Grades Low-
ered 40 Cents a Barrel.
Making Total Cut This
Month \$1.40.

As predicted in The Standard earlier in the week a general cut in the price of flour is being made. On the announcement by the board of grain supervisors that the price of No. 1 northern spring wheat for the crop of 1917 was fixed at \$2.21 per bushel, Canadian millers of spring wheat flour yesterday decided that they were again justified in making further changes and lowered prices for all grades 40 cents per barrel, which makes net reductions since the first of the month of \$1.40. First patents are now quoted at \$11.60, seconds at \$11.10 and strong bakers at \$10.90 per barrel in bags.

There was good inquiry from local and country buyers for supplies and fairly active trade was done for prompt delivery and for shipments within thirty days. On the other hand the tone of the market for winter wheat flour was firm owing to the scarcity of supplies on the spot for which there was good enquiry, but as dealers found it impossible to get shipments from Ontario millers promptly, they were obliged to refuse to take orders for large quantities of business was checked to some extent. Sales of 80 per cent. patents were made at \$11.50 per barrel in wood and at \$5.50 to \$5.75 per bag, but more at the latter figure.

\$700,000 U. S.
CONTRACT FOR
CANADA MILLSWill Weave 2,000,000
Yards of Cloth for Ameri-
can Government.

It was learned last night that the Canadian Cottons Ltd., which controls mills at Marysville, Milltown and elsewhere, and is closely allied with the York and Cornwall mills of this city, has closed an order for a contract for two million yards of cloth, known as the type of khaki shelter tent duck. The amount of money involved in the transaction is understood to be in the immediate vicinity of seven hundred thousand dollars.

The order is attracting more attention than usual inasmuch as it is placed by the government of the United States and the Canadian corporation has competition there from the big mills of New Hampshire, New Jersey and Maryland. A. O. Dawson, vice-president of the Canadian Cottons, Ltd., confirmed the report that such an order had been contracted for. It develops that the company has been filling large orders for the Canadian government, which it is claimed, has given every satisfaction. A sample of the cloth was submitted to experts of the American government and it met with their approval. Mr. Dawson states that the company is well equipped for executing the contract. The general business of the company is highly prosperous.
