STOCK TRADING SMALL IN SCOPE AND VOLUME

All Stocks Were But Little Responsive to the Passing of the Money Crisis and the Market Took a Dull Turn.

New York, June 19.—Stocks were less responsive today to the passing of the money crisis, and trading, while well over the million share mark, was smaller in volume and scope, the market frequently lapsing into periods of absolute dullness.

Call loans opened at six per cent, the lowest initial quotation since last Friday, later easing to five on an abundant supply. Offerings from local sources were supplemented by an inflow of interior funds, but time money remained firm.

Observers of monetary conditions predict further shading of rates, including long maturities, by the mid-year, when large sums will be available through heavy interest and dividend disbursements.

News bearing up security values was mainly of domestic origin, advice from various centres confirming recent reports respecting favorable crop prospects, industrial, progressive and general trade expansion.

The absence of excited dealings and wild fluctuations in oil, motors and other speculative favorites was the most conspicuous feature of the session, these issues ruling firm to strong until the final hour, when pressure, partly from professional quarters effected a sharp reaction.

The reversal extended other prominent shares in more moderate degree, but food fertilizer and chemical issues pursued a contrary course, scoring gross gains of 2 to 7 points.

Rails, motors and shippings and metals were also carried down by the setback towards the close, the market ending with an irregular under-tone. Sales amounted to 1,250,000 shares.

Trading in bonds was comparatively light, and restricted, but steady for the most part. Total sales, par value aggregated \$9,350,000.

Old United States bonds were unaltered on call.

The New York market acted in a perfectly natural way opening strong, after the break the market had, it was only natural that those who bought on the decline would take profits. The interest rates will be higher this month than they have been for some time, but it looks as if the money situation is shaping better.

New York, June 19.—The market presented few features of interest in the afternoon. It became largely a trading affair with price movements confined within a comparatively narrow range. United Cigar Stores made a new high above 100. Republic advanced 3 points, but subsequently reacted. U. S. Steel was firm but only fractionally above the previous close.

Trade reports on the steel industry shows a steadily increasing percentage of mill capacity operating and orders for structural steel in May were double those of April. The idea persists in the Street that a merger of a number of smaller producers will ultimately be brought about.

The market sold off in the last hour but without developing any actual weakness. Sales 1,287,700.

GROSS EARNINGS OF C. N. R. FOR WEEK OF JUNE 4TH

Toronto, June 19.—The gross earnings of the Canadian National Railways for the week ending June 4, 1919, were \$1,036,470, an increase of \$2,951 over the corresponding period in 1918. The gross earnings for the C. N. railways from January first this year to date were \$38,532,444, an increase of \$5,348,092, as compared with the corresponding period last year.

TACTICS EXPERT ONLY ANOTHER GERMAN SPY

As an example of how thorough the German spy system was before the war, Brigadier General Viscount Hampden told at a welcome to homecoming troops at Hitchens a story of which the following account was given in "The London Daily Telegraph":

They had him down for the weekend. On the Sunday they went over a lot of experience. While talking about an imaginary conveyer, Weyland Vindict, it was noticed he called it "Velym." His name, by the way, was von Something or other.

They who fought in 1914 will think it extraordinary, but they had got a German. The night before, at dinner, he told them he had invented an entirely new weapon which threw an enormously high explosive a short distance. Only those in the Tynes salient knew of it. The speaker fancied that invention was their old friend "Minnie." The expert also said that the English government had refused his invention, and the German government also.
