A. C., is dangerously ill from enteric at Pietermaritzburg. His next of kin is Mrs. Fanny Hall, Toronto.

CANADIAN GOVERNMENT VOTES \$50,000 FOR WEST INDIA AFFLICTED.

Supplementary Estimate for This Sum Brought Down by Hon. W. S. Fielding—Opposition Leader Speaks in Support of the Contribution—The Item Passed.

Ottawa, May 14.—(Special)—Hon. W. S. Fielding handed to the speaker a message from the governor-general transmitting a further supplementary estimate, and the house went into committee of supply. In committee, Mr. Fielding explained that the supplementary estimate was for \$50,000 for the relief of the sufferers by the volcanic disaster in the West Indies.

The numerous fissures in the mountain's sides continue to throw out and the subterranean murmurings and tremblings indicate continued unrest.
