

The nobles and the merchants, as well as the clergy, belong to what was the "privileged class" and still ranks as such. That is to say they enjoyed certain exemptions and advantages which did not belong to the peasants. As has been stated, these privileges have about disappeared. The complaint of the merchant that his family was not received in high society because it was in trade is essentially a social question; the government has nothing to do with it. It is worthy of note that the noblity has ever scorned trade; to this day representatives of commerce are regarded as inferiors, and the consul of Great Britain in St. Petersburg is not invited to a court function or even bidden to an affair where members of the imperial family will be present.
