A L M A N A C K.

Although the terms *Calendar* and *Almanac* are in general regarded as synonymous, there is, nevertheless, a material distinction between them.

The calendar, strictly speaking, refers to time in general—the almanac to only that portion of time which is comprehended in the annual revolution of the earth round the sun, and marking by previous computation, numerous particulars of general interest and utility; religious feasts; public holidays; the days of the week, corresponding with those of the month; the increasing and decreasing length of the day; the variations between true and solar time; tables of the tides; the sun's passage through the zodiac; eclipses; conjunctions and other motions of the planets; &c. &c.; all calculated for that portion of duration comprehended within the YEAR.

We may with propriety use the words *Calendar* or *Almanac* for any particular year; but, as allusive to Time in general, *Calendar* can alone be properly applied.
