Modern Flax Mill Planned by Gov't

DEMONSTRATION PLANT PROPOSED FOR WESTERN ONTARIO
Ottawa March 17.—The war materials board of Great Britain has confirmed by cable its intention of diverting the use of Western Canada flax-growers the 10,000 bushels of seed now held at St. John N.B. The flax seed was in the first place commandeered by the Canadian Government on behalf of the British board and the first intention was to ship it to growers overseas. The seed was grown in Western Ontario.



Bread War in Toronto Lowers Loaf to 10c.

BAKERS SAY IT IS MADE AT A LOSS

TOBONTO, March 18.—Bread is slowly climbing back to its old standard price and the bread war seems to be drawing to a close. It is now quoted by the managers of the largest bakeries in the city at 10 cents a small loaf or 10 tickets for \$1.00. Even at this price they say that they are still losing, for the Labor Department at Ottawa reports a cost to the manufacturer at 10.1 cents for a 24-ounce loaf. "So that we are still losing out, but I do not think that it will belong before prices will right themselves," said one manager.

In the matter of Labor legislation, he also said it will fall without backing provided by the league. The British, according to this statesman have been proceeding on theory that the league covenant necessarily would be included in the preliminary treaty but in the past few days because of contrary views expressed in some quarters, precaution was taken to refer the matter to the international league authorities. The latter's opinion, rendered to-day, was that there is nothing in either the covenant nor treaty to prevent the inclusion of the former in the latter.

The necessity for the incorporation of the covenant in the preliminary treaty, this statesman said, is partly an outgrowth of the fact that through the peace work, questions have arisen which it is impossible to settle in all their details and which consequently were referred to the league to determine later. Many of those questions affect Germany, he said, and it is therefore essential that Germany sign a treaty which incorporates such references.

Ukrainians Have Entered Przemysl

POLES HOLD ONE END OF CITY
LONDON, March 18.—The Ukrainians have entered Przemysl, according to an announcement by the Ukrainian directory, a wireless dispatch from the Berlin reported to-day. The Poles will hold the northwestern part of Przemysl but traffic has been stopped on the Przemysl-Lemberg railway.

Three Premiers Are to Confer With Wilson

ON THE LEAGUE COVENANT AND TREATY
PARIS, March 18.—An important conference between Premier Lloyd George, Orlando and Clemenceau will be held at President Wilson's residence to-day. This gathering of premiers, representing the supreme directing force of the peace conference, takes the place of a session of the supreme council, which has been postponed until to-morrow to permit the meeting.

The question to be discussed is largely one of securing accord between the Great Powers on all phases of the peace treaty and its early presentation to Germany.

It is expected an agreement will be reached as to the inclusion of the league of nations as an integral part of the peace treaty, in accordance with a resolution which has already been adopted by the peace conference.

Special interest attaches to today's conference in view of recent reports of divergences of opinion between the powers as to the inclusion of league plan in the treaty.

Olympia is Bringing 5000 Canadians Home

THIRD MACHINE GUN SECTION ON IT
SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., March 18.—The 3rd Machine gun battalion sailed on the Olympia on March 14. The Olympia is understood to carry about 5,000 Canadian troops on this trip, the first on the Canadian transport service since returning from the American service. These troops are presumably third division troops and the 3rd Machine Gun battalion.

NORTHERN END AND VESTRY OF ST. MARY'S CATHEDRAL DESTROYED

WINNIPEG, MAN.—Mar. 18.—St. Mary's Cathedral, the palace of the Arch-diocese of Winnipeg, is burning and it is feared cannot be saved. The fire started at an early hour this morning in the vestry and soon spread to the main structure. (Later)—The fire in the Cathedral was extinguished after the northern end of the edifice and the entire vestry had been destroyed.

Peace Conference May Intervene in Ireland

TO FOCUS ATTENTION ON DEMANDS

LONDON Mar. 18.—The more aggressive section of the Sinn Fein party in Ireland contemplates a campaign similar to that adopted by militant suffragettes.

At the moment there is a prospect of the peace conference intervening in behalf of Ireland. This will be for purpose of focusing public attention on the demands of party.

Kingston Endorses This City's Plan

FOR GREATER CONTROL OF MONEY EXPENDED ON SUB-URBAN ROADS

KINGSTON Ont. Mar. 18.—At a meeting of the Kingston city council it was decided to support the petition of Kitchener, London and other municipalities in their request to the Ontario legislature to have the Suburban Area Commission Act amended. There is dissatisfaction over legislation which allows a commission to expend its money on pieces of roadway twelve miles from the city, thereby neglecting roads leading immediately from city limits. The council is of the opinion that under this legislation too much power is given the rural districts.

Kiel Canal Will be Internationalized

FORTS OF HELIGOLAND TO BE DISMANTLED

PARIS, March 18.—The fortifications on the Island of Heligoland, Germany's formidable base in the North Sea, must be dismantled. This decision was reached to-day by the supreme council of the allied war board.

It was also decided that the Kiel canal should be internationalized and made available to ships of all nations on even terms.

The disposition of German warships is not likely to be included in the treaty of peace. Germany will, however, be required to surrender title to the ships. The ultimate ownership will be determined.

Additional Afternoon War Dispatches

Covenant to go Into Preliminary Treaty

British Delegates are Strongly in Favor.

REASONS WHY IT SHOULD BE INCLUDED
PARIS, March 18, (By Lowell Mellett).—The so-called preliminary peace treaty will contain not merely the principles of the league of nations, but the actual covenant itself, unless the British delegation's views undergo a radical change in the next two weeks, from those expressed authoritatively to the United Press to-day.

It was further stated that the British delegates advocate the immediate selection of a Secretary-General for the league. In other words, the league itself will be an actual fact in a very few weeks, unless the German delegates refuse to sign the preliminary treaty, on various allied parliamentary bodies refuse to ratify the pact.
