Track and Field is indeed becoming a popular sport in metro but due to the lack of facilities, six female potentials are hindered.

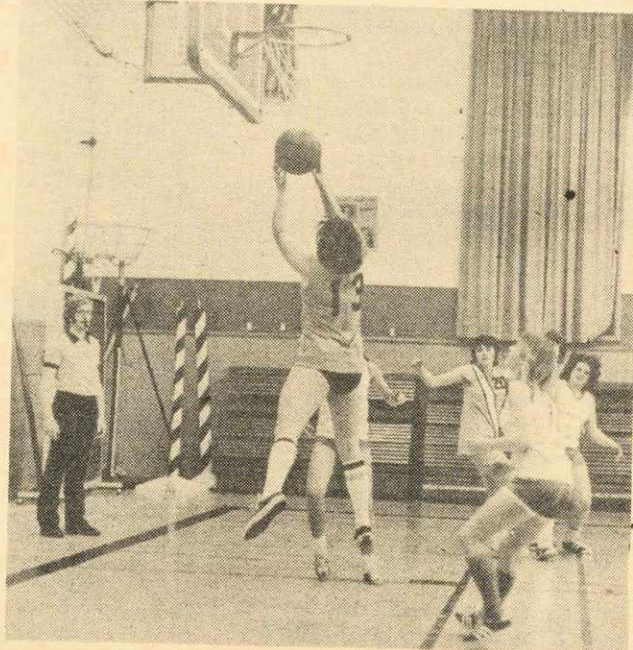
