All hearts went out to young Tracey Wainman and her partner Dale Thomson in the pre-novice dance com-

petition. Tracey, a grade four student at Thornwood public school, paired up with 11-year-old Dale of Toronto, to take second spot behind Dawn White, 11, and Kent Grice, 14, both of Woodbridge. Tracey competed against skaters up to seven years her senior.

Tracey and Dale work out of the new Oakville club under the coaching of Rosina Peckham.

In the pre-novice men category, Shaun McGill, of the Credit Valley club was second behind Tim White, of Barrie.

Neil Barnett, 16, of Streetsville came fourth in the same competition.

Raiders win third title

It wasn't a totally unexpected championship, but for Mississauga Raider coach Alex Orr it was the best as the Raiders rolled to their third straight Central Ontario Senior Football League pennant Saturday over the Northwestern Ghosts 27-0 at Centennial Stadium in Etobicoke.

A gracious winner, Orr paid tribute to the Ghosts singling out the fine defensive work of the Northwestern club that held the powerful Raider offense scoreless until the second last play of the first half.

"Northwestern is always tough. We knew we had to play football to win," said the jubilant coach.

It was the big play that killed the Ghosts. Northwestern closed down the Raider offense for much of the game but the Mississaugas took advantage of Ghost miscues to put points on the scoreboard.

With the minute flag up indicating time was running out in the first half, the Raider defence came up with a Ghost fumble and handed the offense the pigskin on the Northwestern 23 yard line. Dwight Edwards ran for a first down and with the clock running down Ray Sabadin connected on a 20 yard field goal to put the Raiders ahead by three at half time.

The field goal demoralized the Ghosts and loosened up the Raiders. Mississauga kicked off, but the Ghosts were unsuccessful moving the ball and were forced to punt to the Raiders. Mississauga took over on the Ghosts' 43 yard line and scored immediately. Edwards scampered 43 yards, through the Ghosts as if they were ghosts which along with Sabadin's convert gave Mississauga a ten point lead.

Northwestern's strategy backfired after the ensuing kickoff. The Ghosts decided to kick off to the Raiders hoping that with the aid of the wind at their backs they would hold Mississauga deep in its own end.

Using only two plays, the Raider offence proved why an opposing team should not give the ball to the Raiders unless it's absolutely necessary. Quarterback Frank Heppell spotted receiver Dave Convery open in the flat and promptly directed the pigskin to him. Convery took off and wasn't stopped until the four yard line. Edwards completed the scoring drive sweeping into the end zone.

A pair of passes to Pat Mallen and a roughing the kicker penalty gave the Raiders a first down on Northwestern's 13 yard line but an interception snuffed out the drive on Mississauga's next possession.

In the fourth quarter, Ghost quarterback Bill Hunt was forced back into his own end zone where he fumbled the football. Ron Bob fell on the ball to complete Raider scoring.

Ray Sabadin although hampered by a pulled groin kicked two field goals and converted all three touchdowns and was picked

as the most valuable player in the game. Sabadin who was the league leading scorer with 77 points kicked well into the wind all afternoon.

Sabadin's kicking was an

important factor in the first half due to the fine defensive play of the Northwestern club. Sabadin was called on to punt ten times in the opening half.

The victory was the 30th in a row for the powerful Mississauga team, the last defeat an 11-10 setback occurring at the hands of the Ghosts during the 1973 season.

Local horse wins

Better B Cool, a two-year-old colt owned by two Mississauga real estate agents and trained by Mississauga resident Glen Magnussen, won its first race in three starts last week.

The colt, purchased as a yearling for \$3,000 by Paul Coughlin and Dave Martin of H. Keith Real Estate, won a \$3,500 maiden race with jockey John Clark aboard.

The race was seven furlongs over the dirt track described as a "quagmire" by owner Coughlin. The offspring of Cartaret-Ruggie Dunit paid \$9.70 for the win.

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Brown ties Ontario freestyle swim mark

Geoff Brown tied an Ontario record and combined with teammate Beth Tanton to capture five first place finishes for the TOMAC swim club at the Block Five Invitational Swim Meet held in St. Catharines on the weekend.

Brown tied the 100 metre freestyle record of 55.07 but just finished behind the eventual winner due to an un-

official timing on his swim. Brown did manage firsts in the 100 metre breast stroke, 50 metre freestyle and 50 metre breast stroke.

Beth Tanton took first place medals in the 100 metre fly and 200 metre individual medley.

In an invitational B Meet held in Peterborough also on the weekend, Angea Anslow won the 10 and under girls'

Highpoint Trophy with six firsts helping lead her TOMAC team to an overall fourth place finish.

Angea finished with wins in the 50 and 100 metre fly, 50 and 100 metre breast stroke, 50 metre backstroke and 200 metre individual medley. She also managed a fourth place finish in the 100 metre backstroke.

Mary Kovacs followed Angea with seconds in the 100 metre freestyle and 50 metre freestyle. Mary also collected bronze medals in the 100 metre free style, 200 metre individual medley and 50 metre backstroke.

In the boys' 10 and under category, Keith Smout picked up two seconds in the 50 and 100 metre freestyle and Scott Gilliard added a third in the 50 metre fly.

In the girls' 11 and 12 group, Jennifer McCleary registered a third in the 200 metre backstroke and a pair of fourth place finishes in the 100 metre freestyle and 200 metre individual medley.

Jody Arnott scored a first in the girls' 13 and 14 100 metre fly and added a fourth place standing in the 100 metre breast stroke.

Andrea Sanzogni added a second in the 200 metre breast stroke.

In boys' 13 and 14 action, Richard Bennett placed second in the 200 metre backstroke and third in the 100 metre freestyle.

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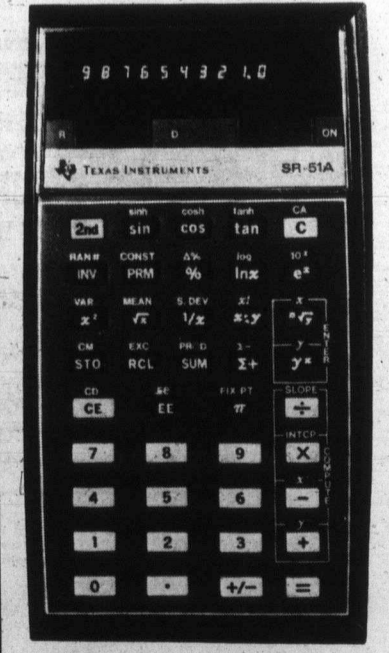
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
