Re: Charles Dudoward-Port Simpson

Mr. A.D. Flowers has sent me a copy of his letter to you concerning the possible employment of the above named as craft instructor at the Port Simpson Indian Day School. I believe that the suggestion made by Mr. Flowers is certainly worth a try, particularly since Mr. Dudoward would have the direction of Mr. Flowers.

At the present time we are doing something along this line at Skidegate, as I believe you are aware, and the Department has agreed to pay for the employment of native instructors at that point. However, before putting this up to the Department I would like to have a little more definite information as to the craft or crafts which Mr. Dudoward will be instructing. I also think that Mr. Flowers should indicate the way in which this work is to be incorporated into his timetable. If Mr. Dudoward is to be engaged only for an hour a day the amount of \$50.00 seems rather high as it would be the equivalent of about \$2.50 an hour.
