The Bishop then spoke of his visit together with the Archdeacon, to Australia, China, and Japan. His Lordship had been sent out in the interests of the Missionary Society of the Canadian Church, and had asked his friend to go with him. While the trip might have been looked upon as more or less of a holiday, the Archdeacon never regarded it as such. He was ever planning how he might further the interests of the Church. On the way out he learned that the Captain and two officers of the ship were desirous of being confirmed. The Archdeacon informed the Bishop, who placed the instructions of the men in the hands of his friend. At the end of the voyage these men were confirmed and made their first communion at the altar in Sydney.
