November.—The Royal Agricultural Society of Britain has a membership of 5,982. It has an accumulated fund of \$150,000, and an Annual Incomé of \$54,000. It distributes \$17,000 in premiums, not one cent of which is expended on the fast horse and his fast master. The entries, as shown by the last report, are all eminently practical. There were more than 370 different implements, and 15 entries for a special premium for the best guard to the drum of a threshing machine. It may be noticed with pleasure that \$2,500 is yearly appropriated for scholarships to be held by pupils in designated schools in superior studies appertaining to agriculture. It shows the British estimate of the farmer's profession, than which now is more honorable, and but few more profitable.
