## FOOD TROUBLES IN GERMANY

**Minister of Interior's Rest Cure Probably Connected With Them.**

London, May 9.—A Berlin official statement says that Clemens, minister of the interior and vice-chancellor, who recently returned after three weeks leave of absence on account of a furuncle, has not yet completely recovered and has therefore been obliged to discontinue work for the present.

Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent, commenting on this statement, says: "The prolongation of minister's rest cure is believed to be closely connected with the recent food troubles in Germany and the inability of the dealers in food stuffs to sell their stocks instead of withholding them for higher prices."

All the Berlin papers give a prominent place to long accounts of the disturbances over the shortage of food, especially to riots occurring before butcher shops where the police were frequently forced to interfere to protect the lives of the owners.

## SIR ROGER'S TRIAL WILL BE PUBLIC

**Judges of High Court and a Jury Will Dispose of Him.**

London, May 9.—The trial of Sir Roger Casement for high treason in connection with the Sinn Fein rebellion will be public. The first hearing will be in Bow street police court tomorrow when a formal charge will be made before a police magistrate. The real trial will be held later before a panel of the judges of the high court of justice and a jury. It is understood that Sir Roger intends to conduct his own defence. The crown prosecutors have completed their case.

Lewis Harcourt has declined to succeed Augustine Birrell as chief secretary for Ireland, giving ill-health as his reason. The choice for Birrell's successor is now believed to rest between Harold J. Tennant, parliamentary under-secretary of war; Col. Sir Mark Sykes, member of parliament for Hull and Brigadier-General John Edward Bernard Seely, former Minister of War.

## GERMANY IS READY TO CLIMB DOWN ON CLAIMS

Does Not Want So Much Now as the Price of Peace.

**MUST HAVE COURLAND**

London, May 9.—The Rotterdam correspondent of The Daily Telegraph in announcing that the Germans have already issued new orders to the commanders of German submarines, in accordance with the concessions set forth in the reply to the American note, appends a long statement concerning Germany's attitude toward peace, which he says is based on information received from Berlin.

He declares that Germany is now willing to give up absolutely any claim on France and Belgium, including even demands for military and economic guarantees of which Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg has spoken in the past.

"In the east," the correspondent adds, "Germany's ambitions remain the same, with the possible exception of autonomy for Poland. Germany will insist on retaining Courland."

## PHILIPPINES GIVE UP IDEA OF INDEPENDENCE

Self-Government Appeals to Them Now More Strongly.

Washington, May 9.—Manuel Quezon, Philippine commissioner, who has been urging Philippine independence, told President Wilson today that he and his followers had abandoned the idea of freedom in the near future, and hoped Congress would pass the House bill giving a greater share of self-government to the islands, but setting no date for independence.

Mr. Quezon urged the president to support the House bill and not insist upon the Clarke amendment approved by the Senate, which would give independence by 1920. The whole question was discussed at length, and the president promised to consult with the Senate and House leaders.

## WILSON SENDS ANOTHER NOTE

Accepts Part of German Reply, But Repudiates the Rest.

Washington, May 9.—President Wilson yesterday sent a note to the German Government, accepting its declaration of abandonment of illegal submarine warfare and rejecting the suggestion that the United States regard this abandonment as conditional upon Great Britain's action with respect to the blockade. The note is courteous in tone, but firm and definite. It is intended to remove all doubt on the part of the Imperial Government as to the position the United States has taken.
