Subsequently the order-in-council was dissolved by the courts, it being declared that the Governor-General had no power to delegate this authority to a minister, and the Hindus were liberated.

NEW MOTHER GOOSE CANADA NOW HAS HER OWN NURSERY RHYMES.

David Boyle of the Ontario Education Department Has Written a Volume of Jingles for Children Which Are Intended to Replace the Ancient Rhymes With New Home-Grown Ones to Educate Young Idea.

"Hoppity, jiggy, jig"
"A squirrel upon a twig."
"Tap! tap! tap!"
"To see him run?"
"Hoppity, jiggy, jig!"

Sounds very much like "Jack and Jill went up the hill, doesn't it?" That's just what it is intended to be. It is the first of a series of nursery rhymes lately published by the Musson Book Co., and they fill a long-looked-for gap in Canadian literature. The author has not put his name upon the publication, signing the name "Uncle Jim." He is a well-known educator of the Ontario Education Department. He has taken the name of his brother James, and supplies the name of his brother James, as Mr. James Boyle is fond of children.

"The nursery rhymes are purely Canadian in character," says the Canadian in charge of the catalog. "The rhymes are designed to take the place of the doggerel verse which the children of to-day are taught in the nursery."

"As long back as I can remember I have felt the need of Canadian rhymes," said Mr. Boyle. "As it is the children of a lot of silly stuff, and they don't know it, and I needed some simple verses with some sense in them which, when the children learned them, would do them good."

"I composed most of them lying in bed at night. I am not troubled with insomnia once I get asleep, but often I am unable to sleep in starting off, as it were. Then it was I would hit upon some idea or verse, and doze off thinking it out."

"The work is the product of years of labor on Mr. Boyle's part, just how many he cannot say. He composed many more than are published, and was a strict censor of an ingenious pen."

"There is no critic so good, no criticism so exact, as that formed by the children of the nursery. It goes beyond the youngster's mental powers," stated Mr. Boyle.

Acting on that principle he gathered a number of children around him and to them he read the verses. Every one they thought poor went by the board, while only those that were selected by the children were published. Many a man will appeal to the youthful mind.

The book is profusely illustrated. The work has been done by C. W. Jefferys. Mr. Jefferys, whose newspaper illustrations are known throughout the whole of Canada, has certainly excelled himself in this regard. All the drawings are illustrated in colors and many of them are undoubtedly works of art.

When the Governor-General came to town

"His lady wore a purple gown,
"But when his Lordship went away
"The lady left a gown of gray."
The verse is surmounted by a drawing of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa, with the King's crown beneath.

"And the rain pours,
"And the lightning flashes!
"How the wind roars
"And the thunder crashes!
"My little boy is as safe as can be,
"Cuddling here on mother's knee."
That is a verse which appeals to every mother's heart.

"Tommy Temper had a fall,
"He bumped his brow and gave a bawl,
"As soon as his head had struck the floor
"He said to himself, 'God bless me!'"
"Niagara never gave such a roar."
"No page is a drawing of the historic Falls of Niagara. The illustration on the bill we bauld the sleigh,
"Down the hill we go with a dash;
"If we don't steer straight the whole of the way."
"I guess you'll see a bit of a smash."
Many of the kiddies' bigger brothers and sisters can give testimony to the truth of the verses. A little bit of nature study is contained in the following:
"A mouse and a wood chuck went out
"And they met a porcupine,
"The woodchuck said 'Good Day,'
"The little mouse said 'Go away,'
"You're rough that I don't like your talk."

THE LONG HALL.

The First Consideration is to Break the Length.

The long, narrow hall which almost invariably has a gain in the average of modern apartments seems to offer very limited scope for effective furnishing, and yet, being the index of the home, from which the visitor gains at least as much care and thought as the rest of the house. A person who has had success in this respect gives the following suggestions:

"The first consideration is to break the interminable length, at the same time increasing its apparent width. To accomplish this plain paper should be used for the walls and of excellent quality even if at the expense of some of the other rooms. Then, in place of the long runner, shorter rugs should be substituted—three or four that range from five to seven or eight feet in length and of the hall width, placed not too close together. Now divide the hall into sections, according to the length, by hanging Japanese portieres across.

"These portieres come at very moderate prices in rush, but the best ones are much handsomer. In either case the portieres may be separated in the center, drawn aside and fastened with a band of some Oriental stuff or a heavy cord. Not only is the effect more attractive, but the apparent width of the hall is increased if the portieres harmonize with or even match the wall paper. The height, too, is further accentuated by the suspension of a lamp or lantern from the ceiling at the center of the sections. The lanterns preferably should be rather small. There are some handsome little ones of wrought iron with colored glass that cost only \$1.00, sufficiently suited for the purpose, the only disadvantage being that they must have candles, which are especially for them."

"Framed pictures, adding ever so slightly to the effect of narrowness, should be avoided, and if decoration is desired it may be accomplished by means of tapestries or handsome antique wall rugs. Armor plate, too, may be used with good effect, and while there is a sharp turn a tall picture screen with three leaves may be spread across the corner, giving a curve in the line of the rather unattractive angle, or in this corner there may be room for a taret for cards or for the telephone or both."

The King's Swans.

All on the Thames Above Staines Are Owned by Edward VII.

For firing a gun at one of King Edward's swans on the river Thames recently Ralph Dickinson, an undiscriminating sportsman, was fined \$110 by the Feltham magistrates. It can be seen that trifling with the king's swans is still a serious offense in England, though it is not, as in the reign of Charles II, a crime punishable by death.

American visitors to England who have gone into ecstasies over the thousands of swans that are such a feature of the Thames may not know that every bird on the river belongs to King Edward or the Vintners company, one of those extraordinary institutions in the city of London which exist for the purposes of banqueting.

George I gave the Vintners the privilege of keeping swans on the river, and they own all the birds below Staines, while the king owns those at Windsor and the upper reaches of the river.

There is constant friction between the king's servants and the Vintners because the birds of both parties will persist in intermarrying.

The Vintners have a great annual function known as the "nicking of the swans," when, to the accompaniment of the consumption of much fine port and sherry, the members of the company go on the Thames and watch their officials catch each swan and mark its wing so as to distinguish it from King Edward's birds.

King Edward has a gorgeous function known as "the keeper of the king's swans," who has a distinctive uniform attached to his office, which is described in "How to Dress at Court," the volume recently published by the command of King Edward.

One of the principal duties of the royal swankeeper is to slay two young cygnets Nov. 1 and take them in state to wherever the king is staying. When the birds are cooked the swankeeper accompanies the dish to the royal table.—New York Times.

"GROWING PAINS."

There's No Such Thing—The Cause and the Remedy.

"When I was a child no one knows what I suffered with what used to be called growing pains. They were usually most intense late in the afternoon or at night. Sometimes mother would say, 'Oh, never mind, dear, you will soon be better, or, 'You will be all right tomorrow, don't cry.' And so I went on until one day the pain really made me ill. The family physician was called in, and he said nine times out of ten these so-called growing pains are muscular rheumatism. For the benefit of other little sufferers I would like to tell you about the simple though efficacious remedy he prescribed," writes a contributor in a current magazine.

"When a child complains of aching legs day or night remove at once the shoes and stockings, put two tablets of a solution of plain bicarbonate of soda in a small foot tub or wash basin (or a wooden bucket will answer), pour on the soda about two quarts of very hot water to dissolve it, put the little feet into this solution as hot as can be borne, add more hot water as needed until the vessel cools and let the feet soak until the water does not feel hot."

"Then dry the feet and legs on a soft Turkish towel to get up a fresh circulation. Now moisten the finger tips of both hands with olive oil and rub the soles of the feet and the calves of the legs, not down, in the old-fashioned way, but up toward the knees. The heat relaxes the tightened muscles, and the oil softens and feeds them. This effort blessed relief to young or old. It is a great mistake to allow any one to put his or her feet on a hot water bag. It makes them tender. But if the room is cold put the hot bag in the bed to warm it before a person gets in. It should be removed when ready to settle down for the night."
