placed a few wires through the centre of the building on which to suspend the larger and coarser exhibits. The articles exhibited were generally very fine specimens and reflected credit on the makers.

Down in the north corner, where the cattle stalls were located, we found the cattle, but no one to tell us who owned the animals with the single exception of Mr. Alex. Atchison, who showed five head of Shortborns. Mr. Atchison secured 1st on a magnificent Shorthorn bull, 3 years old, weighing 1,600 lbs. He also secured 1st on cow, 1 year old, heifer, and calf. With regard to the quality and condition of the cattle shown we see that the scribe of the pens says they were mostly in fine condition and much better than previous years, while we have no name part the stock was not in first class condition. As both of these gentlemen have no doubt had large experience in stock raising, we will submit our opinion in between and say that the lot was in fine condition and part was not.

The swine had been removed from the grounds on the evening of the first day. Consequently this department was not open. The new building erected this season for the sheep department was well filled. R. G. Murphy, Ed. Johnston and John Peterson were the principal exhibitors, Murphy carrying off the sweepstakes prizes as well as six other prizes in South-downs. While the track at Delta was in far better condition to show horses to advantage than at Unionville, the show of horses was not nearly as large, although a large proportion of the teams shown were at the Unionville fair. In carriage teams W. G. Parish, Farmersville, secured the red tick and first in general purpose team.

Implementa were very well represented on the ground, the Wisconsin Combined Seeder and Mower, Mowseeder and Harrow being the principal centre of attraction in this line. A. E. Hickey, Delta, showed a number of very ingeniously constructed horse and cow tags which attracted considerable attention. A fine new hearse with basket heavily mounted, was a special feature of the exhibition. R. P. Chamberlain, Delta, was the exhibitor. Alex. Stevens, Delta, had the pleasure to show a number of carriages in opposition to the Gannaque Carriage Co., and succeeded in carrying off a fair share of the prizes. The Gannaque Carriage Co. had nearly 20 carriages and cutters on the ground and succeeded in selling a large proportion of them.

The horse race did not attract as much attention this year as usual, Bill Wilson, Ben Rydyk and Billy Rydyk being the only horses entered in the 2-40 and 2-18 classes. THE CHEESE MARKETS, BROCKVILLE, Oct. 1.—The markets have continued very quiet and substantially unchanged. Liverpool cables refer to move forward sufficiently to encourage an advance, and remains at 48c. About 3,000 boxes of August and September goods were sold here at 9c. to 9 1/2c. for very fine cheese. It is said that the grow contracts were made at 9 1/2c. for September and October make, but this is not verified. Exports now reach 816,265 boxes, against 850,555 for last year's corresponding date. The selling prices mean very small and unsatisfactory returns for farmers. Last reported transactions at London, Oct. were offered, 4,050' rest, 2,830, some at 8 1/2c. and the rest at private terms. Ogdensburg; offered, 1,800, which was sold at 8 1/2c. to 9 1/2c., with a few lots at 9 1/2c.

The Brockville Calamity, The search for the bodies of the victims of the disaster has been continued without intermission ever since the occurrence of the event. The search party on Sunday afternoon was successful in finding the yacht, at a spot a little lower down the river than the supposed scene of the accident. The little craft was found in 90 feet water. The bodies were found upon her. About ten o'clock the forenoon a telegram arrived in announcing that the remains of Harry Bagg had been recovered. This news has been confirmed. The success has been reported, and the mournful search still goes on.
