VESSELS CANNOT SINK THE

Calcium Chloride Used to Keep Them the Water's Surface

A French engineer, M. Henri Ma riolle, claims to have invented a sys-tem by which the sinking of ships can be prevented. Though it remain to be proved whether it will be practicable to apply the same on a large scale, the idea in its detail is, in-deed, ingenious. M Mariolle pro-poses to attach to the sides of the vessel a large number of bags. Each of these bags is to have a capacity of 15,000 litres, and will be covered by several coats made of a mixture of wool, cotton and India rubber the latter preponderating. These bags are to be placed all around the ships, a trifle above the water line, and cen, when empty, be placed in holes in the ship's sides. A strong iron sheet then shuts up the holes ontairing the bags. From the lower part of the bags a tube leads down almost to the surface of the water, closed up at the bottom by a little valve which opens inward; in each hag their is a certain quantity of calcium carbide. In case of an ac cident, and when the ship begins to sink, it cannot dive to more than one-third of its size, for the water rising around the vessel opens, means of pressure, the valves of the above described tubes, penetrates the bags, wets the calcium carbide, and a quick development of acetylene gas ales place, whereby the bags are nflated, thus removing the sheet iron cover. This process is performed within a few seconds. As all bags work simultaneously, the vessel is considerably lightened and kept

Mariolle has calculated that a high ocean steamer can in this manner be aved from sinking if it is provided with 150 of those bags each containing 50 kilograms of calcium car-bide, which will fill them in case of an accident with 2,250,000 litres of cetylene gas.

The Accompanist.

After the requisite piano training the pupil is required to learn the instrumental parts of oratorios, operas and songs, to be played afterward with the teacher as soloist. The teacher sings in an extremely "ad libitum" narner, that the student may learn to accommodate her accompanimen to individual interpretations. The comes the test of playing an accom-paniment at sight, which naturally is the most difficult part, but an es sential one.

The good accompanist sinks her own individuality completely and almost breathes with the singer in her absolute sympathy. A solo player rarely accompanies well because he s more interested in the piano work than in the vocal and cannot subordinate the accompaniment of the song. You did not know perhaps that the tailor business, like every other pro-fession, is gradually being divided up into specialties. I have taken the bumpy people, as you call them, for my particu-lar patrons. For the past five years I have been working almost exclusively along the bumpy line, and now fully twothirds of my customers are people trou-bled with some physical imperfection which they want concealed or, where that is impossible, reduced to a minimum by their clothes.

"It stands to reason that it is a difficult thing to give a deformed man a good fit. It might seem to the casual observer that any tailor who can turn out a well fitting any tailor who can turn out a well fitting suit of clothes for a sound, upright man ought to be able to do proportionately good work for a cripple, but this theory does not hold water in practice. I know scores of tailors up town who do first class work when sewing for their own trade, but as soon as they infringe on my specialty they make a botch of everything they lay their hands on. Their incompetency in that line is due chiefly to the tendency to give attention to the whimsical notions and suggestions of patrons.

"As a rule, a man whose physique is out of kelter is very sensitve in regard to his shortcomings. He naturally wants the defect minimized to the greatest possible degree, and he has a grist of ideas which would, he believes, tend to improve his appearance. The tailor who has not learned from experience the cut

consider that I am competent to fit the worst case of crooked limbs or bad back on record, and, while I listen patiently to directions and apparently defer to wishes of my customers, in reality I fol-low my own judgment, and the conse-quence is I am troubled by fewer kickers than any other tailor of my acquaintance. I am quite proud of my reputa-tion too. There are hosts of these bumpy people in town, and it is high time som body was making a special study of their anatomy."
