### IMMIGRATION BUNGLES.

The fact that in a great many cases a very undesirable class of immigrants are being brought into Canada, has been the subject of many heated discussions among men of this city who take an interest in public affairs. Only a short time ago a local clergyman in the course of his sermon undertook to score in no uncertain terms the action of so-called immigration agencies in making Canada a dumping ground. The following, which appeared in a despatch from London, Ont., recently gives an idea of how the matter is viewed in that city.

"The police authorities are beginning to recognize the seriousness of the state of affairs that is becoming so prevalent in regard to the increasing number of immigrants who come under their care.

"The chief trouble seems to be that some of the cases are those of half-witted men who are being flooded on the country by the department and are filling the asylums and other public institutions because they are not responsible citizens and not able to discharge the duties and obligations of even an ordinary member of the community.

"When interviewed in regard to it Saturday, Chief Williams said that the seat of the trouble was in the old country. The philanthropic institutions in the old country would not send their good citizens to the colonies, but keep them at home, where they had plenty of employment for them.

"The steamship companies and emigration bureaus and such like receive a bonus for every man they send out, and the better class do not come in touch with them," he said.

"The immigration institutions with their so-called high ideals, and talk of the great work they are doing in bringing out immigrants for Canada and Australia are only doing it for the money that is in it, and any kind of a man will do as long as he is of age.

"Do you think that I would help send men to Australia and such places as long as they would make good policemen? I don't think so, and I don't think that these institutions would either.

"Many of the landed gentry in England are interested in this emigration business and it is a fact with many of them. But don't you think for a minute they will send their good men out here. It is the undesirable class that they help out of the country, and send over here."

"The chief went on to say that it gave the people in this country an altogether wrong impression of old countrymen in general, and it made it hard for the better class to get positions when they were entitled to them on their own merits alone, because of the bad repute that the emigrants had gotten into through the selfishness and graft of the people who made a business of sending emigrants out.

"The police court have had several cases of insanity of a more or less dangerous type in the last two or three weeks, and the county authorities have the same tale to tell as numerous cases come under their notice of emigrants of unsound mind."

### BIG FIRE IN UTICA.

Factories Burned and Railway Station In Danger.

Utica, N.Y., June 6. — Fire broke out in the elevator shaft of the Smith Table Company plant at Mohawk yesterday morning and is estimated to have caused about \$100,000 damage before it was gotten under control. ### NEW STEAMSHIP SERVICE.

British Capital Backs Line From 'Frisco to Australia.

New York, June 6. — A British steamship service is about to be started between San Francisco and Australasia, to take the place of the American Oceanic Line, which recently went out of operation. The first ship of the new service will sail on August 1. The new service, which is to be called the Australian Mail Line, is backed by the British shipping firm of Andrew Weir and Company, of London and Glasgow. A regular monthly service will be maintained.
