## NEW STEAMSHIP SERVICE.

British Capital Backs Line From 'Frisco to Australia.

New York, June 6.—A British steamship service is about to be started between San Francisco and Australias, to take the place of the American Oceanic Line, which recently went out of operation. The first ship of the new service will sail on August 1. The new service, which is to be called the Australian Mail Line, is backed by the British shipping firm of Andrew Weir and Company, of London and Glasgow. A regular monthly service will be maintained.
