A New High Kite Record. Meteorologists are interested in se curing observations at high altitudes by means of kites and lately at the aeronautical observatory at Lindenburg. Prussia, a record for height was made, a kite being sent up to an altitude of 21,100 feet. This was accomplished by goodlay up for his current. plished by sending up six kites attached to each other by the use of a length of wire line approximating 48,000 feet in length. The instruments carried by the kite recorded a minimum temperature of 12 degrees. ture of 13 degress F. as compared with 41 degrees F. at the earth's surface. At the maximum altitude the wind blew at the maximum altitude the wind blew at a rate of fifty-six miles an hour as compared with eighteen miles an hour at the surface. This maximum altitude exceeds by nearly 1,100 feet the previous record made by M. Teisserenc de Bort in the Baltic sea flying his kite from a long of the surface. RARE CLOCKS.

One Queen Anne Timepiece to Be Seen

ronto. It may interest the public to know that one man in the employ of a big jewelry firm in that city spends three days of every week in visiting private residences, business houses, and factories, to wind up the big old clocks that are kept as helrlooms or that are kept as helrlooms or curiosities in these places. Half of his time every week is spent in making the round of these places, and winding and regulating their old timepieces. He says that the majority of the clocks keep remarkably good time, too, when one takes into consideration the fact that they have recorded the flight of Quite a Fad.

Call it whim or fad or fancy, or what you like, but the fact remains that many of the best and biggest families in Toronto have a penchant for rare old clocks. The older the clock the better. If it has "dwelt in marble halls" in some age of the dim and distant past, they value it so much the more. A family heirloom of this variety is treasured most carefully.

So great has this fancy grown on some of Toronto's families that it is commonly reported that they go traveling on the Continent, and buy some old clock that strikes their fancy. It is then brought home and installed in the family residence. The European dealers in curlosities have learned of this, and they play on the ignorance of the buy-

Old Case, New Works.

The story goes that a Toronto man went traveling to Europe, and in a French shop he thought he had discovered a very ancient and rare specimen of a timepiece. He bought it for a good big figure, and when he got back in Toronto was humiliated when an expert on clocks informed him that he had been duped. The clock he had bought was a new one throughout-new case new works, new everything—but it was done in the old style, and after an old design. Well, perhaps it doesn't matter much, and the uninitiated may never know the difference between the old and the new, but it must make that man uncomfortable when he look at the fac

of that French clock. \*
In one shop in Toronto at the present time there is an old clock made in the time of the good Queen Anne of England. Three hundred years old, and certainly a curiosity. It is made of brass, and the weights and pendulum are entirely exposed to view. The clock is not meant to be cased. It hangs on the wall, and the face and works are enwall, and the face and works are enclosed partially in a little box-like structure. There is no minute hand traveling around its face. Still, it has two hands, one to indicate the hours, and the other to indicate where to set the alarm. The dial is divided into quarter-hour spaces. It came to the shop for general repairs, and had to be fitted with new weights, and new pendulum, and other parts.

Has Three or Four.

Has Three or Four. An old gentleman living on Gloucester street has three or four old timepleces in his house, and he knows the history of them all. They have been handed down from generation to gener-ation, and are genuine herizoms, Mr. E. F. B. Johnston, the well-

known lawyer, when he was in Europe some years ago, secured a very old clock of German make, and rather curious design. It has two bells on that top, and it is so arranged that the hour is struck on one bell, while the half-hour is sounded on the other.

Many of the quaintest old specimens of the clockmaker's art come from France. One seen recently was prob-ably a century old, and was in the rather original globular form. Inside there was a place for a small light, probably of the power of a candle, and on the outside of the globe the hours were marked. The indicator is fixed so that, as the globe slowly and regularly revolves, it shows the hour of the day on the transparent globe. A clock of this sort is meant more particularly for the sick room, and for the nurse, who has to give food or medicine to the patient at stated intervals, which are 

measured by hours. Made of Wood. Then, there are many old and quaint time-pieces inlaid with brass, and ornamented with tortoise shell. There are clooks made entirely of wood—these are German, and are made in the Black Forest-and it may be interesting to note that oil is never used on these wooden clocks. Black lead is the sub-
