E. M. Bill, Esq., L. L. B., of Shelburne, son of W. C. Bill, Esq., of Bill town, has been appointed Judge of Probate for Shelburne County.

Mr. Albert Stewart, who has been home from Mansfield, Mass., on a short visit, returned on Saturday morning. Mr Stewart has a good position in his new home.

The esteemed pastor of the Baptist church has exchanged pulpits the past two Sundays—last Sunday with Rev. Mr. Fraser and the Sunday previous with Rev. Mr. Groulx.

Mr. James Wilson returned from the United States on Saturday last, after an absence of some months. He says Nova Scotia is the best place after all and intends remaining here.

Mr. John Hargis, who, for a number of years has owned and occupied the American House, has, we understand, sold out to Mr. Lewis Duncanson, who will take possession about the first of May.

One of the chief events in town last week was the ball at the Village House on Thursday evening. A large number of invitations were issued and the attendance numbered over one hundred, representing Wolfville, Halifax, Kentville, Canning, Port Williams, Grand Pre, and other places. Those who were present report a most pleasant time. The committee having the affair in charge are to be congratulated.

Civic elections take place at the Town Hall on Tuesday next, the poll opening at 9 o'clock in the morning and closing at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. There will be no contest for the mayoralty, Dr. E. P. Bowles being the only candidate and thus elected by acclamation. For the vacancies in the council the candidates are the three retiring councillors: Dr. A. deW. Hays, C. R. H. Starr and Geo. W. Borden; and A. A. Pines, J. B. Davidson and E. L. Collins.

The Posthumous Poems
OF MRS. W. W. TAYLOR, NÉE MISS JENNIE BLACKADDER, DAUGHTER OF MR. W. C. BLACKADDER, OF WOLFVILLE.

In the present number of the ACADIAN begins a series of pieces which will be continued for some time in the succeeding numbers of this paper. The pieces are the production of my beloved sister, the late Mrs. W. W. Taylor, of Avonport. They were, I believe, written a little previous to, and during the years in which she was engaged in the teaching profession; and some few were then published, but the great majority of them are now to be printed for the first time. Most all of the manuscripts which I have had access to, were merely the manuscripts of composition; out of the whole there were only four corrected copies; hence a large number of discrepancies are present, which would not have been had the work been thoroughly revised by the author. The publishing of these posthumous lines is the last act of respect due to the memory of my departed sister; and perhaps the public will excuse, if I present them a few lines of my own in commemoration of her who sleeps the last long sleep of death.

Afar in the east shines the rising moon;
And the shadows away;
Softly the winds their low dirges tune;
Sadly the pine boughs sway.
Here where the moonbeams silver the mound,
Slates is sleeping her slumber profound,
Deaf to the world and each warring sound;

CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of the ACADIAN.

The three collegians have followed with much interest the very gentlemanly and scholarly contributions to your paper by "Hearer." They deliberated for some time before deciding whether to answer them or not but at last thought that a mere recognition of them, sufficient to show their contempt both of the writer and of his productions, would not be out of order. He attempts to throw some reflections on the fact that they are collegians. Now it seems to them that a person who cannot discriminate between the most vulgar slang and good Queen's English should be the last person in the world to deprecate the least semblance of learning. With the most sublime assurance imaginable he threatens "to run the three collegians out of church," and on a little investigation it is discovered that he had no connection with the church whatever. With a wary glare in his eye he threatens to drive them from the pew in which they have been assured they had as much right as he. He states that they disturbed a large part of the congregation. The collegians inquired of all who sat within hearing distance of them if such was the case and were assured that there was no disturbance whatever. They took the trouble of seeing the esteemed pastor of the church who informed them that he heard or saw nothing of what they were accused. And yet "Hearer" presumes to state that a large part of the congregation was disturbed—sublime egotism. As he himself states in his last production the three collegians waited on him and talked things over in a decent, gentlemanly manner, and there in the presence of witnesses whom they can produce he made a full and ample apology. But here comes this brazen impudence and underhand treatment of the man. He promised to put in the ACADIAN a statement of the case as it really was and as they dictated it to him. Imagine their surprise when they found a mean, contemptible and presumably sarcastic note "hoping that it will restore their wounded honor." And this is the person (the term is used advisedly) who talks about proper conduct in church. The whole matter resolves itself into a mere spite, this piece of personal spite, as he himself practically admitted. If "Hearer" constitutes the whole church as he apparently assumes, then his plea has a little force; if not it is a mere, valueless fabrication which only requires to be noticed in order to be treated with the contempt which it deserves.

THE THREE COLLEGIANS.
To the Editor of the ACADIAN.
Sir,—It is hardly probable the residents of the Ridge, outside the water district, were aware of the small amount they would be required to pay toward the expenses of street lighting when they petitioned the Town Council to be relieved. The facts are: there are twenty-nine ratepayers living outside the water district; according to the present assessment their share of the tax for street lighting would be \$10.40. Take from this number Mr. Geo. H. Wallace, whose business is on Main street, and who pays much the larger share of the amt. (i. e. \$2.45) we have the remaining twenty-eight who are required to pay seven dollars and ninety-two cents (\$7.92) or eight cents less than the cost of one light per year.
