NOTES AND COMMENTS

Of more than 51,000,000 passengers carried on Canadian railroads during the year ending Dec. 31st, 1921, only four were killed and 240 injured.

Of the 748,000 inhabitants of Boston, according to the recent United States census, 39,247 were born in Canada. Of these, 51.3 per cent. have become naturalized.

The alternative of going to church on Sunday or paying a fine is suggested by the Rev. Robert Forman Horton, Great Britain, one of England's most noted Nonconformist ministers, as a means of raising sufficient revenue "to run the country without plunging it into bankruptcy." Such legislation, he declared would net 80,000,000 pounds a year. Dr. Horton's suggestion is said to be based on a law passed in the reign of Edward VI., when anyone absenting himself from church "without lawful or reasonable excuse" was fined one shilling. The law was repealed, but re-enacted and rigidly enforced in subsequent reigns.

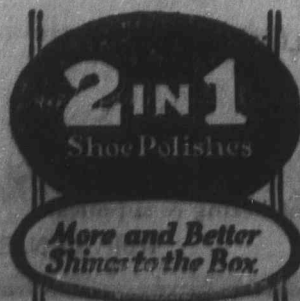

TUBERCULOSIS GOES WITH CIVILIZATION

Tuberculosis came with civilization, and it will stay with civilization until civilization defeats it, according to Prof. Chalmette, of the Pasteur Institute, Paris. He insisted that in the modern cities of Europe and the United States practically no adult escapes tubercular infection. He estimated that 20 per cent. of city population are infected at the age of 2 years, 55 per cent. at the age of 5 years, 90 per cent. at 15 years, and about 97 per cent. of all those above that age.

A Dominion-wide radio convention will be held in Toronto on September 8 and 9, the last two days of the regular Canadian National Exhibition. This convention will bring together leading figures in radio circles in this country and several noted experts from the United States. In addition there will be held a show with booths run by various manufacturers of radio equipment, at which will be displayed the latest type of transmitting and receiving apparatus. It means that Canada is definitely "on the map" in the matter of nationally organized interest in the most talked of science of the age—radio telephony.

USE OF THE DIFFERENTIAL

The function of the differential in automobiles is to give flexibility to the axle, through which the power is transmitted to the wheels. When the car is turning a corner, the outside wheel travels farther than the inside wheel, and this difference is taken care of in the differential by an arrangement of bevel gears and pinion.

Mud and dirt that have become hardened in the cells of the radiator should never be removed with wire or a tool. Then thin cell walls are easily punctured and small leaks in the radiator invariably result. Use water directed from a hose to clear the passages, with the stream guided from the engine side.

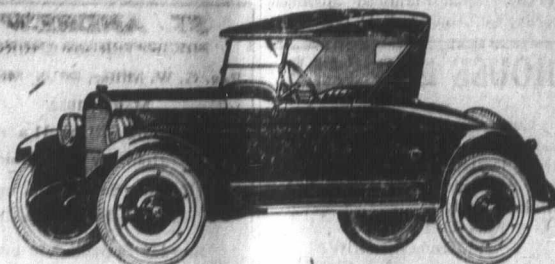

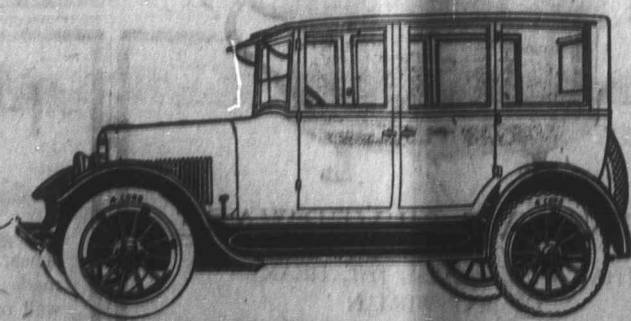

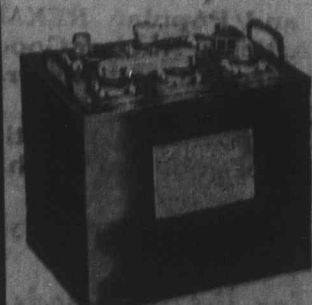
