U. S. DEBT IS CUT BY \$4,800,000,000

WASHINGTON, March 3.—The pub-lic debt of the United States has been cut more than \$4,800,000,000 in the four and a half years since the Great War indebtedness was at its peak, Aug-ust 31, 1919. Figures made public today by the Treasury show that at the opening of business Satúrday the national debt was \$21,781,966,852. It has been re-duced \$933,000,000 in the last year.




