To Have a new Reservoir.

At a special meeting of the ratepayers held on Monday evening for the purpose of voting an amount not exceeding \$5000 for the water works a motion was made by Dr. I. B. Curtis that the present reservoir be raised a few feet and that the whole be lined with concrete. There was some discussion and the mind of the meeting seemed to favor an entirely new reservoir. Whereupon S. S. Miller moved that a new reservoir of 150,000 to 200,000 gallons capacity be built of cement at a cost not to exceed \$5000. The vote was unanimously in favor of this.

The Commissioners were instructed to make the necessary loans and to proceed with the work.

The present reservoir has a capacity of 110,000 gallons and will be used as additional fire protection.
