### Surrounding the Child with Musical Atmosphere

The significant thing about the player piano is that it does not limit its work to cultivating the desire to hear music but is equally effective in stimulating the desire to produce it. The child soon wants to master the technique and create the music himself. It is the instinct to do—the impulse, which once awakened, is the teacher's most potent ally. It means that the child will begin his music lessons voluntarily, not simply under parental compulsion; that he will persevere in them because he has a vision and an aim, that vital motive which no mere sense of duty or plodding industry can replace.

To surround the child with an atmosphere favorable to awakening the instincts we wish to cultivate, then to take those instincts in hand and develop them in the way they should go, is the whole theory of the modern organic or "natural" education. Growth from within is the watchword; superimposition from without is taboo. Even the most conservative educators admit the advantage of the new conception. The only objection to it, that it is not practicable where large groups of children are concerned, falls away entirely in the case of private music teaching.

### Treatment Of Broody Hens

There often is a large and altogether unnecessary loss in the summer production of the farm flock, due to the idleness of numbers of broody hens which are permitted to remain on the nests indefinitely for many weeks. If such hens are removed from the nest as soon as broodiness develops, are placed in a comfortable coop, well fed and well watered, they can be broken up promptly.

Any sort of pen that will prevent or discourage sitting will answer the purpose, but it is true economy to provide well-constructed coops capable of accommodating three or four hens or more supplying enough of these so that all "broodies" can be taken care of without delay.

As good a plan as any is to make coops with slatted fronts and bottoms wide well-constructed coops capable of them on legs or trestles two or three feet off the ground and locating them in the shade of a tree. The slatted floor compels the hens to stand, which helps greatly in discouraging broodiness. These coops, if constructed as here described, will serve a double purpose, as they can be used to good advantage later in special-fattening fowls for table use.

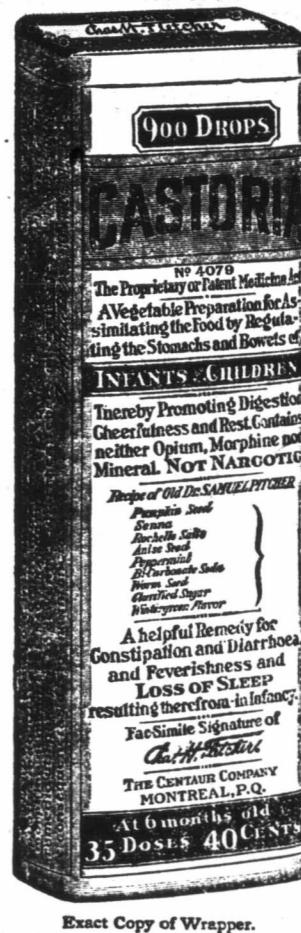
Do not mistreat broody hens by the abusive methods so often recommended, but make them comfortable, feed them well, and keep them supplied with water. If so treated they will begin laying within a very short time after they get over being broody, whereas, if they are starved and mistreated, it may be weeks before they will become productive again.

### Hot Weather Rules For Horses

1. Load lightly, and drive slowly.
2. Stop in the shade if possible.
3. A sponge on top of the head, or even a cloth, is good if kept wet. If dry it is worse than nothing.
4. Water your horse as often as possible. So long as a horse is working water in small quantities will not hurt him. But let him drink only a few swallows if he is going to stand still.
5. When he comes in after work, sponge off the harness marks and sweat, his eyes, his nose and mouth, and the dock. Wash his feet but not his legs.
6. If the thermometer is 75 degrees wipe him all over with a damp sponge, using vinegar water if possible. Do not wash the horse at night.
7. Saturday night, give a bran mash, lukewarm; and add a tablespoonful of saltpetre.
8. Watch your horse. If he stops sweating suddenly, or if he breathes short and quick, or if his ears droop, or if he stands with his legs braced sideways, he is in danger of a heat or sun stroke and needs attention at once.
9. If the horse is overcome by heat, get him into the shade, remove his harness and bridle, wash out his mouth, sponge him all over, shower his legs, and give him two ounces of aromatic spirits of ammonia, or two ounces of sweet spirits of nitre, in a pint of water; or give him a pint of coffee warm. Cool his head at once, using cold water, or, if necessary, chipped ice, wrapped in a cloth.
10. If the horse is off his feed, try him with two quarts of oats mixed with bran, and a little water; and add a little salt or sugar. Or give him oatmeal gruel or barley water to drink.
11. Clean your horse at night, so that he can rest well, and clean him thoroughly. The salt dandruff drying on his skin makes him uncomfortable, and often produces sores under the harness.
12. Do not fail to water him at night after he has eaten his hay. If you don't he will be thirsty all night.
13. If it is hot that the horse sweats in the stable at night, tie him outside, with bedding under him. Unless he cools off during the night, he cannot well stand the next day's heat.
