





The present deression was the ugliest and most illvisaged that had ever made its appearance There was a falling off in revenue, ever in creasing, and this was what the hon. member for East Simcoe called by the deluded name of depression. It would be idle to think that the present depression was a simple recurring one. The evil-was of a more alarming character, and due to a more abiding cause : the enormous public debt which burdened the country and the high tariff which had been imposed under promises of development which never materialized.
