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EDMONTON WON AGAIN FROM COW PUNCHERS

Carney's Crew Meets Bitter Defeat at Hands of the Deacon's Bunch by Score of 7 to 5.

Playing pennant winning ball, the Edmonton team took another stride towards the top of the league by defeating Calgary a second time last night by seven runs to six.

The game was won in the first innings when Fitcher Starbridge was batted out of the box and four runs scored.

Although Hickey was unsteady in the opening innings and issued three passes Calgary only got one run.

Their run all came singly in the first, second, fifth, seventh and eighth innings.

After the first couple of innings Hickey steadied down and he was hit freely throughout the game and kept the fans in suspense for a good part of the time.

Edmonton's ground was up in the ninth to go in and pull the game out of the fire when a neat double play put an end to Calgary's threatened rally.

The game was witnessed by an even larger crowd than that which saw the contest of the previous day, and the interest and enthusiasm were quite as intense.

The play was keen and full of features.

CONSERVATIVE LEADERSHIP.

Conservative Caucus in Calgary Has Not Formally Named a Leader.

Calgary, July 5.—The Conservative convention met at 10.30 this morning with J. D. Hyndman, vice-president of the provincial association, in the chair.

It was a very representative gathering from all parts of the province.

Only preliminary matters were talked over at the morning meeting.

The meetings this afternoon and evening were surrounded by every possible precaution to maintain the absolute secrecy of the proceedings.

At a late hour tonight no inkling had been given to the man selected by the special committee appointed for the purpose, and which met in the Grain Exchange Building, to be leader of the Conservative party in the provincial legislature.

It is thought that perhaps C. A. Magrath, Conservative member in the Federal House for Medicine Hat, has been selected.

R. B. Bennett, junior member for Calgary, in the caucus is reported as being a strong contender for the good thing that the province did not own its timber and mineral lands as if it were so there might be a very serious danger that by this time Jim Cornwall, Charlie Cross and W. Cousin of Late King of Serbia Married in San Francisco.

San Francisco, July 1.—Miles M. Gopcevic, said to be a cousin of the late King of Serbia, was married here to a girl named the O'Farrell street car line, and Miss Marion E. Dodd, who enjoys the reputation of being the most successful business woman and hardware merchant in San Francisco, were married last week at the Russian Church.

The bride is the daughter of Col. Marshall Dodd, a retired army officer, who served from the beginning to the end of the war in the United States of Kentucky.

She is a handsome brunette, and when she appeared at the Fairmount street store, which she operated as a dressmaker, she attracted a lot of attention.

Several years ago, while still a humble gripman, he married a girl named Harriet Floyd, the only daughter of a distinguished naval officer.

She was one of the famous belles of California. By her death, which occurred only a brief time after the wedding, he is said to have inherited \$1,000,000.

REFUSES VATICAN'S REQUEST.

Spanish Government Will Not Withdraw Decree of Toleration.

Madrid, July 2.—The government has forwarded to the Vatican its reply to the note of June 27th, which insisted upon the withdrawal of the decree of June 11th granting privileges to non-Catholic religious societies.

The reply states that the government refused to withdraw the decree.

The government has submitted a bill to parliament substituting a simple promise of non-interference for the decrees which were taken over the scriptures in connection with all civic acts.

The bill, which is supported by the King, applies to the installation of cabinet ministers as well as to court proceedings.

SHOOTING AT BISLEY

Canadian Team Makes a Good Second in the Empire Match—Great Britain Secures an Easy First by Superior Shooting at Long Ranges.

Bisley Camp, July 2.—The Empire match, the first part of which opened in heavy showers yesterday, was concluded today in drizzling rain, making, of course, shooting conditions extremely difficult.

The Canadian eight will hold their own at the 800 yard range, but at 900 yards, while they are a good second, the Great Britain team by brilliant shooting established what was considered a winning advantage.

The Englishmen, naturally enough, shot to better advantage under the weather conditions than their R.A. conditions being service rifles in use by the military and naval forces of Great Britain or overseas.

By a mistake it was said last night that Singapore had retired after the two first ranges, but this was an error.

Yesterday's totals were as follows: Canada 1125, Great Britain 1139, Australia 1385, Singapore 1081, India 1060.

FLEW OVER MONTREAL.

Count DeLesseps Made Successful Flight on Saturday.

Montreal, July 2.—Count DeLesseps, on Saturday made a flight from the aviation field at Lakeside to the city of Montreal.

The distance is 30 miles and the time occupied was forty-nine and a half minutes.

The flight was made in the Blériot monoplane in which DeLesseps crossed the English channel. It did not arrive until Saturday morning, but the Count's mechanical skill was shown by the fact that he landed on the city at a height of two thousand feet, the monoplane caused unusual scenes on the streets.

People left their houses, stores were emptied of customers and clerks, and street cars stopped to let passengers have a view of the flying Frenchman.

The display of a dozen automobiles for several minutes before the Count started.

Several automobile parties, including one containing his brother, tried to follow the Count's flight far in the rear.

There was a crowd of nearly ten thousand on the field, and when DeLesseps returned and made a perfect landing on the grass stand, he received a tremendous ovation while the band played the French National anthem.

When DeLesseps stepped out of his machine, E. Kenyon, manager of the Wright team, and Coffey, one of the aviators, picked him up and carried him on their shoulders.

Walter Brookes was in the air making a high flight when DeLesseps reached the park and when the American came down the Count's machine with him a bouquet had been received from his admirers.

Instead of being rivals the Frenchman and the American during the match, they were great admirers of each other. Most of the machines were out of order on Sunday and the program was postponed for the week.
