## HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

Coffee pots and teapots in which borax water is boiled two or three times a week are purified and entirely free from musty taste and odor.

When anything has burned in the double boiler, instead of replenishing the steamer part with hot water, use cold water for the same effect.

Vaseline rubbed into the eyebrows will make them grow heavier and darker. For the same reason it should never be rubbed anywhere else on the face.

To remove the odour of fish or onions from pans, wash in good soda, then place pan inverted over the flame of the gas range or put in hot oven for a few minutes.

To warm over oysters left from patties, add a little milk and a little fresh seasoning and heat them in a small saucepan in a vessel of boiling water.

Cut a couple of pieces about an inch long from an old garden hose and slip them over the faucets and you will save many necks in china and such things.

Bites of insects as well as summer rashes will cease to give pain if bathed in borax water, and it is also quite efficacious in curing burns, scalds and wounds.

When without ice and desiring to make pies in warm weather, measure the required amount of lard and cold water and beat them together until the lard is cooled.

Bicycle cement will repair holes in tire bags, but should not be used for

Hot water bottles. Nothing short of vulcanizing will repair the latter so as to resist hot water.

If you have not a fish kettle and strainer for boiling a fish whole, try the expedient of placing the fish on a plate and putting the plate and all on a piece of cheesecloth.

When the hands get hot and uncomfortably moist it is a good idea to wash them in hot water and then rinse them in cold water to which a desertspoonful of borax has been added.

When milk is burned, pour it at once into a pitcher and stand it in a basin of cold water until it is cool, when it will be found to be quite free from the burned smell and taste.

A delicious salad is made by paring large, sweet peaches. Cut a section from the top of each and carefully remove the stone; fill the cavity with mayonnaise and serve in lattice cups.

Cincinnati is said to be the largest manufacturer of soap of any city in the world. The largest factory there has a monthly output of twelve million pounds. There are no trusts or combines there but many small plants have gone out of business, not being able to compete with the strong firms doing business there.

Sir Ernest Shackleton says: "Capt. Bartlett stands as good a chance as anyone in reaching the South Pole." He ought to stand a better. The gallant lieutenant told an audience in Boston that "The pole is moving every day. I am convinced that the part of the earth where the South Pole now is was once in the present temperate if not torrid zone."

The Canadian Government has decided on issuing a Canadian silver dollar. Minister Fielding in making the announcement said: "We are now using Cobalt silver, and Canadian copper, and we hope to coin Canadian gold. The new gold coin will have the King's head on one side and the Arms of Canada on the other. The full design has not been settled."

Lieut. Shackleton, in one of his lectures in the States, was telling the people how it felt to be hungry. He said: "After they got back to civilization his party could not eat the meal of ordinary men; but they soon made up for it. They then made up their minds that they would never see a hungry person flattening his nose against a cook-shop window without giving him something. Experience is a good thing!"

Andrew Carnegie has recently been giving some advice to young men, and the "Man in the Moon" includes one of the items in his notes to-day, not on account of the person who uttered it, but because of the truth it contains. Here it is: "Pick for your wife the girl who takes care of her mother—the girl who is useful in the household and does not make the most show in the ball-room." And in emphasizing this advice, he told the boys before him that "My mother and wife have made me all I am."

The Tories in Canada are in trouble. It appears that there are quite a few of them disappointed in Mr. Borden, the leader of the Opposition in the Dominion House. The Navy Bill introduced by Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the rock on which the party seems to have gone to pieces on. The opposition numbers 86 members, and it is said that that of number about 30 want to displace Mr. Borden. Mr. W. F. McLean, owner of the Toronto World, is credited with starting the open campaign against his leader, and he has been aided by the Toronto News. It is hinted that McLean is ambitious regarding the position held by Mr. Borden, but that he has no support beyond himself. There are several others who would like the position—which, by the way, is worth \$9,500 a year—but they have no following. How it will "pan out" is a question no person can at present answer. But it is likely D. W. P. will tell us all about it after it comes to pass.
