To compile these works involved very great care and toil, and one of the best rewards that their authors can have is to know that their books are read by the people of the country.

It is to deepen, if possible, an interest in this direction that I publish such notes as these. Whatever tends to create a deeper interest in our country's development is worthy the attention of the people, and among other things necessary, a knowledge of its literature is of first importance. In this connection we are fortunate in having securing scholarly contributors, and many able writers have come to our help, and the efforts that these authors have made cannot be lost. Such dignitaries as His Grace the Archbishop, and the Rev. Canon

Smith, Rev. Dr. O'Reilly and the Rev. John Reay, have fearlessly championed our cause in the columns of the daily press, and have scored many a victory in our favour. And no less has been the valor of our lay contributors, foremost among whom rank such men as J. P. Howley, H. W. LeMessurier and H. F. Shortis. 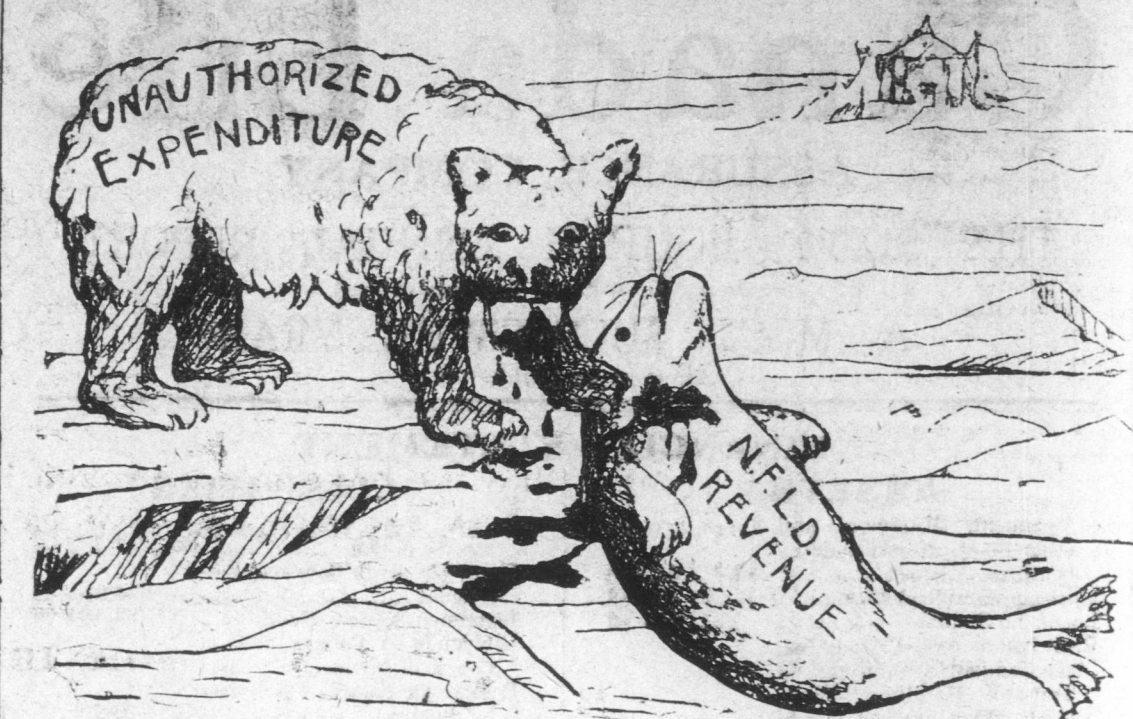

CEARS' AGRICULTURAL POLICY.

ST. PETERSBURG, This Morning. An Imperial Rescript announces the intention of the Czar to complete his grandfather's work in the emancipation of serfs by transforming peasants into not merely free but into economically strong landholders. This will be achieved by affording peasants facilities to leave their communities and by the improvement of agricultural science.

Hints to Householders.

A most important report on Gas Fires, prepared by officials of the Glasgow Corporation, two of which were Mr. F. W. Harris, Corporation Chemist, and Mr. Peter Dyle, Sanitary Inspector, was published at the end of last year. Two dwelling houses were taken for six months and in these the officials carried out a series of careful tests during that period. These tests proved that the efficiency of a Gas Fire is equal to, if not better than, that of coal; that, hygienically, a gas fire compares favourably with a coal fire; and that the relative cost of gas and coal for heating and cooking are not such as to make the former uneconomical by comparison.

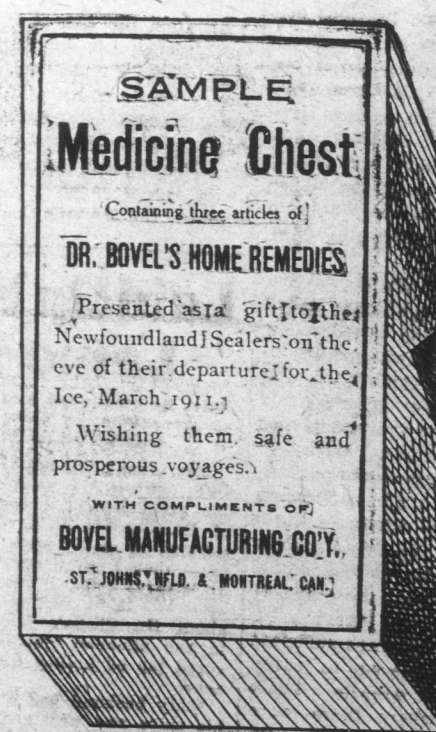
