An Important Move.

In the big conflagration which occurred in Toronto, in April, 1904, several hundred concerns, some of them large, some medium and some small in size, were practically put out of business. In the former class E. W. Gillett Co. was numbered. A few months after the fire they moved into their fine, up-to-date factory which, at that time, looked to be sufficiently large for a good many years. Cable News.

LONDON, To-Day. Horatio W. Bottomley, editor, newspaper proprietor, financier and independent liberal member of Parliament for South Hackney, was condemned at a trial presided over by Chief Justice Alverstone to pay \$250,000 to the estate of the late R. G. Masters, a retired Madras civil servant. It was alleged that Bottomley had obtained \$255,000 through representation by selling Masters' worthless shares in various undertakings promoted by Bottomley. The plaintiff was Mrs. Curtis, a daughter of Masters. Masters was supposed to be wealthy, but he died penniless. On investigation his papers disclosed he had been connected with big financial deals with Bottomley and Telah Hooley, another promoter, whose meteoric career astonished the city a few years ago. The Chief Justice granted a stay of execution on condition the whole of the \$250,000 would be paid into court within a week.

SAN FRANCISCO, To-Day. Two earthquakes, the heaviest since the big shake of 1906, and separated by only a few seconds, jarred the central portion of California and Western Nevada on Saturday. Each lasted five seconds. Only trivial damage has been reported, but in San Francisco and other cities in the affected area a panic occurred in the streets and restaurants. There was a pell-mell exodus from the large buildings. San Jose reported the shock of the day at the heaviest experienced since that time, but it did no serious damage. A deep booming and reverberating which usually marks disturbances of a wide-spread character, accompanied the first tremor. At San Francisco, the groaning and cracking of steel structures played a large part in frightening people.

An American Schooner Seized.

The Marine and Fisheries Department had a very little doing, realizing there is little fish oil to be had at any price. Dealers are taking things easy. Cod has been for the last two months. The oil produced from the menhaden fisheries which should be coming into the local market now, is sadly disappointing so far. The fish are lean. There are plenty of fish, the factory people say, but they lack the oil this year. Spermi and seal oils are very steady, with none to be had. The schooner Tees from Halifax landed 50 tons of whale oil at Vancouver, B.C., last week. Just what people who use fish oils do for the lack of it is not point that puzzles many dealers. Within the last two months for instance, only 120 barrels of cod oil have come into the port of New York from Newfoundland, and 60 barrels of this came in from St. John's yesterday. The previous shipment was received on April 29. Last year during the correspond period exactly 3,718 barrels of cod oil were received in New York. The figures are furnished to The Fishing Gazette by N. S. Job & Co. Europe helped out the local market somewhat Monday by sending from Rotterdam 200 barrels of cod liver oil.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette.

PATIENTS FOR ASYLUM.—A woman of Mr. Grace came in by train to-day and was taken to the Lunatic Asylum. A woman patient also came in from Twillingate.

BOOKED FOR LABRADOR.—Mr. H. Bridge and Rev. Mr. Hester are the only passengers booked to-day to go to Labrador by the s.s. "Solway." It is likely that she will not sail till Wednesday.

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FIRE TO-DAY.—At 11:50 to-day an alarm of fire was turned in from box 117 for a blaze at Geo. Waters' residence, Bannerman Street. A spark falling on the roof fired it and a few buckets of water quenched the blaze. The Eastern and Central news responded to the alarm.

OUT FOR SHEBENS.—Sergeant Byrne and another officer made a pretty thorough search of the city yesterday in hunting for illicit sellers of liquor. Nothing was found, however, and owing in a great measure to the vigilance of the police in this respect St. John's is a pretty "dry" town on Saturdays.

TOOK MANY MEN.—The S. S. Progress arrived here from Bell Island this morning and returns this afternoon laden with goods. Saturday yesterday she brought large numbers of men from Bell Island to Clapnet's (each to spend the night) in the morning. She returned with them last evening.

DIPHTHERIA AT PLATROCK.—Four cases of diphtheria have developed at Platrock, there being 3 patients—children—in one house and one in another. Dr. Brehm visited the place Saturday, and the infected houses have been quarantined. The disease is of a mild type, and the patients are doing well.

BANKER IN PORT.—The banker St. Clair, of Burin, reached here yesterday afternoon from the Grand Banks with 250 quils. cod after fishing for 5 days on caplin. She gets more bait if possible to-day and will again sail for the Banks to secure more cod. A fleet of bankers baited on the South Shore, Saturday, and sailed to the Banks where cod is reported plentiful.

A NOCTURNAL PROWLER.—The people who reside on Water Street just east of Market House Hill were surprised about 12:30 yesterday morning to hear a noise at the rear of their residences and on investigating some there and evidently with no good intention. When he saw that he was noticed he quickly vanished.

ANOTHER BANKER HERE.—The banker Francis Smith, Capt. Randall House, of St. Breton, arrived here from the Banks at 10 last night hauling for 200 quils. for 5 days work. She had fine weather on the Banks, round fish plentiful, and used up all her caplin bait. She goes to Clapnet for another outfit. The vessel has 7 dollars and 100 quils. to her credit to-day.

GLASGOW, To-Day. A great demonstration of seamen and dockers was held yesterday. The men marched through the streets headed by bands of music. Mr. Wilson, the General Secretary of the Seamen's Union, made a speech and said they intended to make it hot for House Secretary Churchill in the House of Commons, because some ships were allowed to sail without qualified crews, thus endangering the lives of passengers. He threatened that if the owners did not come to time, the strike would extend to every port in Europe.

Laurier Returning.

LIVERPOOL, To-Day. The Empress of Britain with Premier Laurier and the Coronation troops aboard, sailed from Ruse on Saturday night. The report that the S. S. Carmania sailed from here for the States on Saturday proved incorrect. The Carmania was not able to get together a crew. The American liner, St. Louis, which sailed yesterday from here will call at Queensferry to take the Carmania's mail. Two incendiary fires were discovered in staterooms of the S. S. Canada, which runs to Montreal. The flames were extinguished without damage.

Flour Famine Threatened.

HULL, To-Day. A mass meeting was held yesterday by strikers in all sections of the city and resolutions were passed that if dockers' wages were increased, in addition to the increases offered to seamen, and the employers agreed to meet men's representatives to discuss grievances, they will return to work immediately. The railway employers met and agreed to strike if called upon to handle goods landed by non-union men. A flour famine is threatened unless a settlement of the strike is soon effected. It is estimated that the grain in the Hull mills will be exhausted within two or three days.

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S.S. Solway Arrives. The s.s. Solway, the boat purchased by the Reid Nfd. Co. to do the Labrador mail and passenger service, arrived here yesterday, 12 days from London. The passage was stormy, especially the first two or three days out, and Capt. McPherson was obliged to lay to for 12 hours. Her gross tonnage is 771 and 407. Her length is 220; breadth 36.1 feet; depth 15.2 feet; H.P., 110. She was built in 1881 at Glasgow by Barclay, Currie & Co. During the past month at Glasgow there were extensive alterations made on the ship to fit her for the Labrador service. There is accommodation for 42 saloon and 70 steerage passengers. The two first staterooms are above deck. Below there is accommodation for male saloon passengers, the room being abaft of the dining room, which has seating capacity for thirty-six people. The ladies' cabin is amidships on the starboard side, where there is accommodation for 12 passengers. The doctor's room and hospital is further forward on the same side of the ship. There is room for ten male and eight female patients, the wards being separated from one another and complete privacy secured. Below decks on the port side are the quarters of the engineers, steward
