

Animals' Speed.

The "speed of a gazelle," "fast as a orse," "fleet as a deer." "slow as an x." are all familiar terms. But few now just how fast or fleet or slow hese things are. An interesting comoutation made by scientists is designed throw light on the matter.

One experimenter figures out that a iding horse cover 40in. while walking; at a jog-trot it covers 11ft. in second. The two-minute-a-mile orse covers 44ft. in a second.

The leisurely ox moves over only 2ft. second when hitched to a wagon, and about 20in. when attached to a plough. The elephant, which can pull more

than six horses, moves over about 4ft. 6in, in a second, and running as rapidy as it can is said to be able to travel out 18ft. in a second. The lion is claimed to run faster an the swiftest hunting horse, which

from 80ft. to 100ft. a second, acording to the country through which is compelled to travel. Tests differ greatly as to the speed f a hare. Some claim it can travel at the rate of 60ft, a second, while others claim it cannot travel more

than half that distance. The great variety of deer are all quite speedy, but in certain localities they can travel much more rapidly than in others. A roebuck has been known to cover 74ft. a second when

The giraffe is said to pass over the ground at the rate of about 50ft. a second, while the kangaroo covers

10ft. to. 14ft. a second. The tortoise is much slower. One 5in in length covers but about 1/6in in a second. -Tit-Bits
