

The New Waterford Mine Explosion.

Nineteen Newfoundlanders Killed--Disaster Worst in History of Cape Breton.

(Exclusive to Telegram.)

NEW WATERFORD, C.B., July 26.—At least 80 men are feared to have been killed by a terrific explosion which occurred at No. 6 landing in No. 12 Colliery here at 7.30 this morning. The disaster will be the worst in the history of mining in Cape Breton. Two hundred and sixty men were at work in the pit when the explosion took place. A number of them have already been accounted for, many of them being brought from the colliery unconscious, semi-unconscious or comatose by rescue party, whose members risked their own lives; but it is believed that the number saved will not be more than 180, leaving a death toll of 80. Of the dead thirty are native, twenty-two are from Newfoundland and ten are of foreign birth. There still are a few unaccounted for. Fifteen of the men were married and most of them leave large families. Identification will be difficult as many of the bodies are charred beyond recognition.

NEW WATERFORD, July 26.—Forty-six of the bodies of the men killed in explosion at New Waterford have been recovered and brought to the surface. They are: John McKenzie, Vincent McPherson, Nelson Millie, Henry Conrad, Phillip Nicholson, Joseph Bonaker, George Fraser, John Snelair, William Snow, Peter Coleman, Frank Barlick, Thomas Miller, Karl Pitlick, Joseph L. Two other bodies are unidentified; one is a stranger, a foreigner, and of the other only the trunk was recovered. Twenty bodies are still in the mine, some of which are buried under heaps of debris. The bodies of those living in New Waterford or district have been sent to their homes. Those from Newfoundland will be sent by the Bruce to Eight. The work of clearing out the mine is going on as quickly as possible but little has been added to

the facts already given and no facts as to the cause of the accident have been secured. The men who were injured and those suffering from gas poisoning are reported as recovered. Most of them have been removed to their homes; two have been taken to the hospital in Glace Bay for further treatment. They are the man Cook, who was badly gassed, and Sampson, who suffered from burns about head, hands and body. Eighty coffins were forwarded from the city to Waterford yesterday to be used in the burial of the victims.

NELDER, KILLED IN SYDNEY EXPLOSION.

SYDNEY, July 26.—Eleven more dead miners were brought from the colliery this evening. The total number of bodies secured to date is 59, but there are still eight unaccounted for. These have been given up as dead which is now placed at 67, although one or two other casualties are possible. At any rate the number of dead will not exceed 70. All the bodies brought out of the mine to-day were badly disfigured. The Newfoundlanders among the dead are—George Delaney, 26, wife and small children, Conception Bay; Wm. Joseph Peach, 27, wife and two children, Salmon Cove, B.D.V.; Wm. T. Parsons, 28, wife and 2 children, Salmon Cove, B.D.V.; John R. Whalen, 36, wife and 3 children, Western Bay; Silas Renalds, 50, married, Perry's Cove, B.D.V.; Reuben Penny, 27, wife, Salmon Cove, B.D.V.; Timothy Fahey, 40, eight children, Small Point, near Western Bay; Geo. E. Parsons, 28, wife and one child, Salmon Cove, B.D.V.; Michael O'Leary, 37, Small Point, near Western Bay, wife, 5 children; Nelson Milley, 19, Western Bay, son of Thos. Milley, who also lost his life; Joseph L. Butt, 37, of Carbonar, wife, 4 small children; Thos. Milley, 45, Western Bay, wife and 5 children; Eugene Kelloway, 36, wife, 9 children, Salmon Cove, B.D.V.; Thos. Crumme, 46, wife, Western Bay; Isaac Boone, 36, family, Salmon Cove, Clarke's Beach; Arthur Kelloway, 41, wife, 5 children, Salmon Cove, B.D.V.; Geo. H. Butt, born Freshwater, wife and child, who came to visit him at Waterford a few days ago; J. H. Rose, Salmon Cove, B.D.V.; Wm. Snow, Victoria, near Carbonar.

The Wanderers failed to score, but the Irishmen came in with another in the last. Thus a lamentable and ludicrous exhibition was ended after a hundred minutes of anything but League baseball. However, viewing the game unbiasedly and without any desire to alibi anyone or anything as Braze repeats the performance and no one to replace him, would naturally account for the large score of the Wanderers; and it should be borne in mind that the B. I. S. got away with 9 runs, (which is the most they ever scored) off the Hartnett crew) and the Irishmen came in winning two games out of the first round. The Cubs are jogging along just behind, while the Red Lions have yet to win their first game in the league fixtures.
