Hr. Grace Notes.

The harbor ferry has not been running for the past couple of days, much to the inconvenience of the residents of Harbor Grace South. The cause of the "hang up" is said to be that the ferryman finds it impossible to carry on the work for the same remuneration as before the war, and has given notice to that effect. This seems to our mind quite reasonable, much more so than to have our South Side friends deprived of the great benefits of the motor ferry.

Mr. W. Noel of the Surveyor General's Department is in town and has with him three returned soldiers, who are to be employed during the summer surveying in this neighborhood. It seems a little oversight not to have given our returned soldiers from this town an opportunity of earning a little.

For months past it has been quite a common occurrence every other day to see a dog in great agony on the street, mostly in the morning, after a half hour or so of apparently terrible suffering the poor brute would succumb to what appeared to be the effects of poison. Small house dogs were attacked in the same way, some recovering, others perishing. There must be a cause for this unusual occurrence, and we would ask the authorities to cause an investigation to be made at once. If it is a case of poisoning, it should be ascertained where the poor brutes were poisoned, and by whose authority. If there is a disease among these animals that cause their death, the remains should be buried at once and not left under the public gaze for hours as has been the case in the past, with the danger of spreading the disease. Children should be warned from going near them while they are thus suffering. If possible when attacked the poor brutes should be put out of misery at once.

A memorial service to the memory of our brave young friend, Sergeant Graham Duff, who was lately killed in action in France, will be held in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church on Sunday evening next. The Rev. G. S. Coffin will conduct the service.

S. and Mrs. Henshaw and son, of Providence, R.I., and E. Mildeberger of New York, arrived at Overall's Grand River, on Friday, where they will spend some time fishing salmon.

C. Fisher tells us that the Hamble River is higher than he has seen it for thirty years. At Sheolford island for instance, only the tops of the trees were out of the water on Saturday.

There is a good run of salmon at Fishchell's, Robinson's and Little Barachois Rivers. But all the rivers have become so swollen by recent rains, that we have been told there is little likelihood of good fishing for some days.—Western Star.

Diana Reaches Henley.

ICE IN STRAITS.

The s.s. Diana, Capt. Ed. English arrived back here on the first Straits trip for the season early Thursday morning. She succeeded in reaching Henley Harbor, where heavy drift ice was met with. On the way north a line got entangled around her propeller at Port Saunders which delayed the ship several hours. Stormy weather prevailed all along the Labrador Coast. She brought report of good sign of cod from Port au Chel to Bonne Bay. Weather and ice conditions in the Straits have prevented any fishery operations there. The arrival of the ship was a welcome sign at many parts of the coast, where the supply of provisions was running short after a long isolation of six months.—Western Star.
