## A Rotten Foundation

A structure that is built on a rotten foundation is destined to tumble in a short time. The Squires-Coaker Government may look strong to the blind adherents of the party in their hour of apparent triumph; but those who look deeper than on the surface know that it is the weakest, most unstable and flimsy political structure that ever grasped power in this or any other country. To those who want to have it so, it seems a thing of strength, but in reality it is a thing of pitiable weakness. So it is with all structures built upon stilted instead of the honest foundation of truth, fair dealing and security. The position of the Government to-day is so pitiable and so pathetic that a feeling of sympathy should go out to them instead of partisan criticism. This is a suggestion to the general public. As for the People's Paper it must do its duty. When we consider the methods used in Conception Bay to turn the voters at the eleventh hour and the small majority that was secured by the trickery practised, and when we consider the reaction that has already taken place there it may be set down with perfect truthfulness that Harbor Grace and Bay de Verde Districts are with the Opposition to-day. "Truth is mighty and it will prevail," therefore let not the friends and supporters of the Opposition be despondent, for a Government won by such unfair tactics as enabled the Squires party to snatch a victory from a people whom they made hungry cannot go on, cannot prosper. Hundreds of the very people who voted for the Government's return have already expressed their regret that they allowed a temporary excitement with an unworthy motive behind it to cause them to vote as they did. The mess of pottage of a day is gone, the sectarian appeal seems foolish on reflection, and the stern realities of getting a living remain. We must accept the verdict of the ballots, but even so we believe that, eliminating bribery and corruption and the eleventh hour sectarian appeal, Harbor Grace, Port de Grave and Bay de Verde are with the Opposition to-day.

## Head Stones for Veterans Graves.

## SHIPMENT ARRIVES FROM ENGLAND.

A shipment of 51 headstones which are to be erected over the graves of deceased ex-Servicemen, interred in St. John's and throughout the country has arrived from England. The stones are similar to those erected in the cemeteries of France and Belgium, and are made of what is known as Hopton wood stone. The carious hudge, rank, name and date of death are engraved on the headstones, and the work of erecting them will be under the supervision of Lt.-Col. (Rev.) T. Nangle. It is understood that a further shipment will be received by the next boat.

## Burgeo Count Finished.

## SMALL WINS BY 37 VOTES.

The election count for Burgeo began at 7:30 last evening and concluded at 10:15 p.m., with Small, the Government candidate leading the poll. The first bulletin showed the Opposition candidate, Wm. McKay Chambers, leading by 14. When the count reached six hundred the Government candidate was 103 behind. The next count showed Chambers 700, Small 641. The subsequent count was Chambers 800, Small 799. The final count at 10:15 p.m. was:— Small (Govt.) . . . . . 808 Chambers (Opp.) . . . . . 845 Mr. Chambers has every reason to be proud of his showing. Practically unknown to the voters he was at a great disadvantage, whilst his opponent, Mr. Small, being representative of the district for the past 3½ years, had all the odds on his side. In addition, Mr. Chambers was unable to canvass the district, owing to being marooned on S.S. Kyle for three weeks. The turnover for the Opposition was the most remarkable in the election. In 1919 Lieut. Small was opposed by Mr. C. T. James, a former resident of the district and although he had the opportunity of canvassing the district by reason of the election being held at a suitable time of year; yet he received only 231 votes against 1,423 cast for Mr. Small. The overwhelming majority of 1,197 has been cut down to 37, which is a remarkable tribute to Mr. Chambers and the cause he represented.

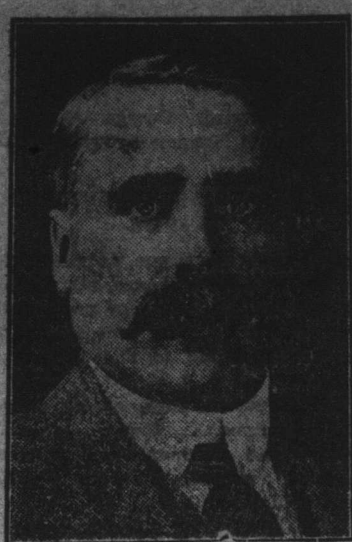

## Air Flight to Gold Fields.

MAJOR COTTON WITH THREE MACHINES TOOK OFF SEVERAL DAYS AGO FOR STAG BAY.

After considerable difficulties in the way of continuous bad weather and mechanical troubles the three aeroplanes of the Aerial Survey Company (Newfoundland) Ltd., as detailed in our issue of May 3rd last, left Botwood several days ago with a party and supplies for the Stag Bay Goldfield. The aeroplanes, which are fitted with skis, were flown off the frozen river of Exports. The ice was in bad condition and the "get off" was made from eight inches of water and slush. The two Westland machines carried a quantity of supplies to Hawkes Bay which is to be used as a base. At Hawkes Bay the ice surface conditions were also very bad everywhere with a foot or so of water and slush. Numerous holes were drilled through the four feet thickness of ice and a sufficient area was cleared to allow Major Cotton in the Martinsyde to get away. His course took him over the wreck of the "Nordfeldt," from which coal is being carted into Flower's Cove. From Flower's Cove the Straits of Belle Isle were crossed to Point Amour on the Labrador Coast, where the wreck of the British Light Cruiser "Raleigh," which ran into the rocks during a fog last August.

Photographs from the air have been secured by the Aerial Survey Company (Nfld.) Ltd. of the "Raleigh." The cruiser is now looking a pitiable sight and is covered with ice and snow. About 70 miles North Battle Harbour is reached where the radio station gives the last touch with the outside world. From here onward very little but ice-bound rocky coast is seen, broken at intervals by great rushing torrents and wide stretches of country. Owing to the poorness of communication, it is not known at the moment the exact point at which Major Cotton has alighted.

**VISITING PORT UNION.**—It is reported that Dr. Campbell has gone to Port Union for a consultation with Hon. W. F. Coaker re the personnel of the Executive under the Incoming Government. Both Dr. Campbell and Mr. Cloutier, Private Secretary to Mr. Coaker, took passage by the Fortia this morning.
