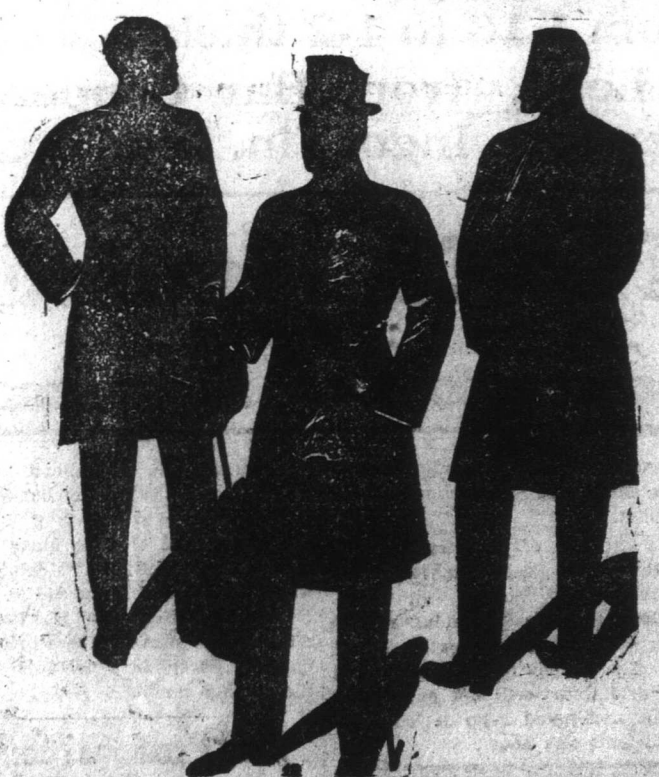

ford; Mr. Gerald Harvey, also at  
Colinet, is doing well; Mr. Thomas

rived at Placentia to-day to spend a  
few days along the rivers. Messrs.  
P. F. Fearn and J. Barnes, who have  
just returned from these resorts, also  
report splendid fishing. It is a pity  
that some attention is not given some  
of the roads which should be made  
more passable. The road from Har-  
ricourt to Colinet, a distance of three  
miles, as well as that of Colinet to  
Placentia, need immediate attention  
and the traffic at this particular sea-  
son of the year means much to the  
people of this part of the district;  
also the numerous sportsmen who  
spend their vacations in the places  
mentioned.

## TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

BELGIANS ARREST 40 GERMANS.  
DUISBURG, July 30.  
Belgians are reported to have ar-  
rested forty additional Germans.  
They will be forced to ride on trains  
as guarantees against sabotage.

## TURKEY AND U.S.A. ARRIVE AT AGREEMENT.

LAUSANNE, July 30.  
United States and Turkish experts  
reached an agreement Saturday night  
whereby the United States receives  
"most favored nation treatment" con-  
cerning the freedom of the Straits for  
merchandise and warships. Accord-  
ing to the report the United States  
without signing the Straits conven-  
tion will receive all privileges.

## SUSPENDED LABOUR MEMBERS MAY RETURN.

LONDON, July 30.  
Premier Baldwin intends before the  
adjournment of parliament to submit  
a motion which would have the effect  
of cancelling the suspension of the  
four members of the Labor Party who  
were suspended from the Commons a  
month ago and who since have de-  
clined to apologize to the speaker. The  
premier would permit them to return  
to the seats after an interval without  
apologizing.

## TRAIN LEAVES BEHIND A TRAIL OF DEATH.

TERRE HAUTE, July 30.  
Nine passengers were killed late  
Sunday when a Pennsylvania express  
passenger train crashed into an auto-  
mobile at Liggett eight miles east of  
here. The train was travelling at 50  
miles an hour and was two hours  
late because of a similar accident  
near Highlands, Ill., in which four  
persons were killed.

## MINERS ENTOMBED—27 ESTIMA- TED DEAD.

SHEFFIELD, Eng. July 30.  
Rescue parties at Maltby Colliery,  
where through an explosion Satur-  
day morning, many miners were en-  
tombled, were obliged to give up the  
work during the night. Only one  
body has thus far been recovered.  
The official estimate of the number  
dead is twenty-seven.

## RUSSIANS RELEASE PRISONERS.

MOSCOW, July 30.  
Twenty five hundred prisoners have  
been released from Moscow prisons  
during this month due to the efforts  
of special commission appointed to in-  
vestigate severe sentences of Moscow  
courts and overcrowding in prisons.

## BELGIANS EXTEND ZONE OF OC- CUPATION.

COLOGNE, July 30.  
Reported that Belgians have oc-  
cupied town of Herford. Dortmund  
Lippe River extended their occupation  
as far as Holstenhausen.

## MORE RAILWAY HORRORS.

CHICAGO, July 30.  
Twenty-four persons were reported  
killed yesterday in six railroad cross-  
ing tragedies, each accident being  
collision between train and car. Five  
were killed in New York, one man and four  
women. In North Carolina a car was  
demolished, one killed and one in-  
jured. A Pennsylvania train struck two  
cars within as many hours. At High-  
land Ill. it struck a car, killing four  
occupants and then attempting to  
make up lost time struck a second car  
in Indiana, killing nine people. At
