## Ontario Legislature.

Attorney-General Mowat moved that the House go into Committee on the Municipal Loan Fund resolutions. He expressed the satisfaction he felt at the manner in which the measure had been received by the country, and claimed, that while it could not be expected to be free from inequalities, it was on the whole a just and equitable settlement of a most difficult and complicated question. They had to consider, of this great amount of indebtedness, first, what they could enforce by way of payment; secondly, what it was just to enforce; and, lastly, what compensation could be offered to unindebted municipalities against the large measure of relief accorded to others. He laid down in the most express terms that no municipality had any moral claim to relief, and urged the House to keep this principle steadily in view during its deliverations. He hoped the new settlement that was proposed, would, to some extent-correct the denforalization occasioned by the errors of past mal-administration. He then alwerted to the effect of the Act of 1859, enacting a five cent assessment basis, and the Act of 1866, which enacted the two cent limitation, as having established a basis on which to found the new scheme of re-adjustment. He urged that nothing could be so fair and practicel as the adoption of the municipalities' own assessment, and declared that to undertake a new valuation by Government would be impossible. He proceeded to explain how the poley of adding railways had introduced a new element into the consideration of this subject, and discussed the policy of the railways had introduced a new element into the consideration of this subject, and discussed the policy of the railways had introduced a new element to take powers—where they deemed it desirable—to sell the debentures, and to hand over the proceeds to the municipalities with the balance in cash. He concluded by pointing out certain provisions made in the interest of the township of Hope, the town of Goderich, and the town of Berlin. There might still, he remarked, be s
