The Pacific Railway and the Canadian Loan Guarantee Bill.

Late intelligence from England confirms the report already circulated, that the efforts of Sir Hugh Allan to raise money among the English capitalists for the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway have ended in utter failure. All the great finan cial houses gave the scheme the cold shoulder. Nearly every one who gave an opinion said the road should start from a point at or near Toronto. Others again thought the capital of the Company too small, and that the Canadian promoters of it should have shown their confidence in the scheme by subscribing more largely than they had done. Great surprise was also expressed at the extraordinary powers granted by the Government, and the fears of many in the soundness of the enterprise were aroused by the charges which Mr. Huntington preferred against Sir John A. Macdonald and his colleagues. And to crown all, the powerful influence of the Grand Trink stockholders in London was exercised to defeat Sir Hugh Allan, and they have succeeded.
