TO PREVENT FIRE.

A Device Which Will Make Steam

Threshing Comparatively Safe.

On Wednesday next the new device pro-

duced by Mr. J. C. Laughlin, of Guelph,

which it is thought will enable farmers to

operate threshers with the engine 400 feet

away, will be on exhibition on the market.

The great loss suffered by farmers from

this source has made some change of pro-

cedure necessary, and from previous ex-

periments it is thought that Mr. Laughlin's

plan will meet the end desired. The power

will be communicated from the engine

by a rope belt and "jack" which will

permit of the engine being placed at an

angle and thus reducing materially

the amount of power required to drive the

threshers as compared with the system at

present in use. Professor Thomas Shaw,

of the Ontario Agricultural College, has

witnessed the operation of the invention

and has been favorably impressed with it.

It is hoped that a large number of farmers

will be present and watch its work on the

market on Wednesday. Naturally the fire
