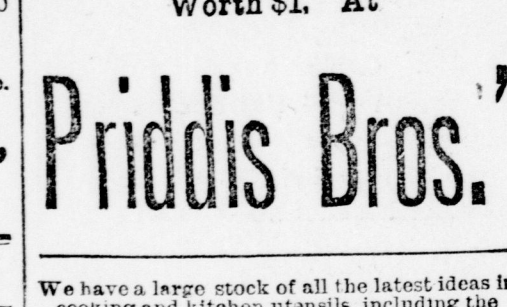

Toronto, Nov. 15.—11 p.m.—The de-
pression mentioned last night now covers
the upper lake region, and an anti-cyclone
of some importance covers the Northwest
States and Territories. A fresh south-
westerly gale has prevailed over the lower
lake region, with a west to northwest gale
in Manitoba.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mr. R. Southam goes to Toronto to
assume the management of the Mail Job
Printing Company.

—Mr. Proctor, chief clerk in the G. T. R.
district passenger agent's office, Toronto,
was in town yesterday.

—Mr. R. Scott, formerly cashier at the
G. T. R. freight sheds, city, has been re-
moved from the Chatham agency to
Niagara, Ont.

—Wm. Hollis was arrested in London
West yesterday afternoon on a charge of
vagrancy. He was brought before Squire
Lacey and remanded till Saturday.

—Mr. Adolphus McLaughlin, son of Mr.
P. H. McLaughlin, of King street, was a
candidate for inspector of polls in Detroit
in the recent election, and distanced his
competitors. The London boys "get there."

—The Knights of Pythias in this city
are making arrangements for a grand re-
ception to Grand Chancellor Harley Mc-
Connell, of St. Thomas, when he makes his
official visit to the local lodges on Dec. 12.

—Anna Marie Forbes was brought to
jail here yesterday, where she will serve
six months for vagrancy. She was arrested
in Carleton township, and when brought
before Magistrate Noble, of Strathroy,
pleaded guilty to the charge.

—On Wednesday evening Mr. William
Patterson of this city, and Mrs. Jane
Hinds, of St. Thomas, were united in
marriage. The ceremony was performed at
the residence of the bride, Manitoba street,
St. Thomas, by Rev. R. McIntyre.

—The sociable last night in the Palace
Dancing Academy attracted a large party
of dance-lovers, who were furnished a
varied programme with bright music by
Dayton's orchestra. Mr. Jas. McCormick
as master of ceremonies saw to it that all
enjoyed themselves.

—It is said that more ladies and children
have been entertained and delighted with
"The Burglar," which will be the attraction
at the Grand Monday next, than with any
other play of recent years. This is but

—The Holden Comedy Company pro-

audience, and in their several specialties
were repeatedly encored. Miss Kate Bruce
and Helen Minkley were also worthy of
mention. Tomorrow night the company
will play "The Wages of Sin," and "Little
Lord Fauntleroy" will be given as a Satur-
day matinee.

—Mr. J. W. Jones yesterday sold the
general stock of H. B. Putnam, of Paisley,
valued at \$10,188 31, to Mrs. Putnam, of
the same place at 57½ cents on the dollar.
The stock of staple drygoods of W. Dun-
bar, of Wheatley, amounting to \$1,312 13,
and the hat, cap and fur stock of A. Rivard,
city, were sold to the same party at 51½ cents and 41½
cents on the dollar respectively.

—Mr. Jones sold the household effects of
the late Capt. West, 709 Waterloo street,
at good figures.

—A dispatch received here last night from
Strathroy in regard to the prisoners
Nathan Fyfe and Percy Thompson, who
were discovered on Sunday night placing
obstructions on the G. T. R. track near
the above town, says: "Conservable Robert
Logan bought the two prisoners to Strath-
roy today, and they were arraigned before
P. M. Noble and elected to be tried by
him. They pleaded guilty to the charge
laid against them. On their behalf Lawyer
John Cameron asked for a remand for a
week to enable the prisoners to obtain a
petition from the citizens of Strathroy,
which might induce the magistrate to
some extent to mitigate their sentence.
The request was granted and the prisoners
were taken back to London." They will
be taken to Strathroy on Wednesday for
sentence.

—The City Hospital.
A regular meeting of the City Hospital
Trust was held at the hospital at 3 p.m.
yesterday. Col. Lewis (chairman), Mayor
Esmer, James Gilmour, T. H. Pardon and
Medical Superintendent J. D. Balfour were
present. The auditor for the quarter
ending Sept. 30, was received and
filed. The superintendent's report was
submitted, showing that 21 patients have
been admitted and 27 discharged since last
meeting. There are 61 patients at present
in the hospital. The superintendent was
instructed to make application at the next
meeting of the council for \$10,000, the sum
estimated necessary to erect the proposed
additions to the City Hospital. Miss Annie
Essex, city, applied to be placed on the
staff of nurses. Granted. Dr. McLeay,
city, will succeed Dr. New as house surgeon
at the hospital for the balance of the year,
the latter having resigned.

—The Board of Works held their regular
meeting in the city hall last night, with
Ald. Thomas Jones (chairman), Dreaney,
Shaw and Garrett, Engineers Graydon,
Secretary Bell and Commissioner Owens in
attendance. Mr. Walter Richards, of
Dufferin avenue, appeared before the com-
mittee in reference to an electric light in
the Agricultural Hall on the Fair Grounds.
The hall had been leased to the Robin Hood
Drill Corps, but no lamp was put in. The
light will be placed, the drill corps to pay
for its use. D. Campbell applied for the
opening of Colborne, between Victoria and
Regent streets. Referred to the assessment
commissioner. Mrs. M. M. Patullo asked
on behalf of the Women's Christian Asso-
ciation that a sewer be constructed from
the Agad People's Home to the river.

—The necessity for the sewer is
great, and the consequences of the work if
not done may be of a very grave character,"
read the communication. The request was
laid over for a week, awaiting a full meet-
ing of the committee. The local "cabbies"
presented a document containing the con-
sent of nearly all persons owning property
in front of which it was proposed to allow
hacks to stand. Ald. Dreaney objected to
a hack standing at the northwest corner of
Dundas and Richmond streets, as it would
interfere with traffic. He moved that the
hack be placed back 75 feet from the
corner. Lost. A protest from Manager
Ingis, of the Bank of British North
America, against allowing two hacks to
stand in front of the premises, was filed.
In connection with the proposal to pave
Dundas street, from Richmond to Ridout,
Engineer Graydon stated that the cost of
the work, with a six-inch concrete founda-
tion, would be \$12,300. Filed for future
