WILL ASK FOR MONEY.

The Board of Education Wants Further
School Accommodation.

And Will Request the Council for Funds—
London's Kindergartens Are the
Best in Ontario.

A special meeting of the Board of
Education was held last night—just to
consider any special, but to conduct
general business, which was booked for
the meeting called for last Thursday
night, but which was declared illegal.
The over-crowded condition of the
schools was the leading question, and
a definite stand was taken in the matter.
The City Council will be asked to fur-
nish the necessary funds for five new
schools or additions to the present build-
ings. No. 1 committee's report (published
on Friday last), on the necessity of
extra accommodation, was discussed,
and it was adopted as follows:

Clause 1. Four-room school on Rich-
mond street north. Two rooms needed
at present; remainder soon required.

Clause 2. Four-room school on the
corner of Colborne and South streets.

Clause 3. Two-room addition at Wort-
ley road.

Clause 4. That four-room school be
erected near corner of Oxford and Wil-
liam streets.

Clause 5. That lot be purchased near
Talbot and Oxford streets, and question
of school thereon be decided later on.

Clause 6. That any new building to re-
place Colborne street school should con-
tain ten rooms for public school pur-
poses, with suitable rooms for model
school and offices for secretary and in-
spector of board.

The cost of the above will be about
\$26,000.

The recommendation to discontinue
the position of kindergarten supervisor
was ruled out of order. Miss Laidlaw
was not granted \$15 for additional ser-
vices.

A clause looking to the enforcement
of the Truancy Law was adopted.

Victoria school will hereafter be the
name of the Askin street school.

Two rooms will be rented in the South
presbyterian mission school on Water-
loo street from April 1 to Easter, in-
order to relieve the overcrowding in
Aberdeen and Simcoe street schools un-
til new rooms can be built in the south-
ern portion of the city.

Miss McIntyre, inspector of kindergar-
tens for Ontario, reported upon the
eight schools in London. She says: "As
a whole, they are superior to any I have
visited. They all work in harmony."

Principal Woodburn, of Princess ave-
nue school, was granted leave of ab-
sence, owing to ill-health.

Mr. Griffin's motions for free text
books and commercial form were refer-
red to committee to report.

Greenlees, Buchner, Craig, Keenleyside,
Campbell, Wilson, Turner, Jeffrey,
Sanders, Wilkins, Anderson, Stevenson,
Secretary McElheran, Principal Mer-

The Motive.

Continuation of the Welter-
Hendershott Trial.Connecting the Insurance Policies
With the Alleged Murder.The Victim's Father in the Witness Box
—Material Evidence of the
Tragedy Produced
in Court.

ST. THOMAS, March 11.—Continuing
his evidence, W. J. Astrander stated
that his prisoner, Hendershott, had re-
ceived a telegram of his nephew's
death, and said he had probably been
killed by a falling tree while running
to get his clothes or watch. Hendershott
also stated that the witness to say nothing
about the policies.

John Ketchabaw, brother-in-law of
the prisoner, Hendershott, said the latter
received a telegram while at the
house near East End, informing him
of the death. Mrs. Ketchabaw,
being afraid that it was her brother,
Wm. Hendershott, the prisoner told
her not to worry, as his clumsy nephew
was working in the woods cutting timber,
and it was probably he, and not her
brother who was killed.

Calvin Gregory testified to finding
in the vicinity of the tragedy and close
to where the axe was found, pools of
water deeply tinged with blood on the
Sunday after the dead man was found.
Miss Welter, the young lady who
was to be the wife of the deceased,
said she had heard the prisoner say
to Hendershott that he would have
to spend considerable money before
he could get "it." The "it" is sup-
posed to have referred to the insurance
money.

Several other witnesses were exam-
ined, but no new points were brought
out up to the time of the adjournment
for lunch.

George Delacey, a printer in the
St. Thomas Times newspaper office,
also said that last fall he had a con-
versation with Hendershott, who was
looking for J. W. Cook, an insurance
agent. He said that he had two poli-
cies on the life of W. H. Hendershott,
that he wanted to break a colt for him,
and that if he broke the colt the colt
would break his neck. Hendershott
also said if anything happened he
would get the money.

David Hendershott, father of the
dead man, was put in the witness box
and told about the conversations he
had with his brother John. His evi-
dence was much the same as that given
by him at the inquest. He was sub-
jected to a long cross-examination by
the defense as to his past record with
view to discrediting his character.
Nothing very damaging to his character
was elicited, however.

Mrs. Bancroft, of the Penwarden
House, testified as to the meeting of
Welter and John Hendershott in the
hotel after the killing. She said that
the two men did not speak to each
other for some time after they met.

Axe No. 3, and a collection of leaves
were placed upon them, which had been
sent to Prof. Ellis, of Toronto, for an-
alysis, were put in evidence, and the
professor took the stand to tell the re-
sult of his examination. He said that
the man was unable to swear posi-
tively as to human blood when com-
pared with that of some animals, yet
his tests all pointed to this being hu-
man blood.

Mrs. Snuck gave evidence as to see-
ing two men felling a tree in Wardell's
woods on the afternoon of the tragedy.
She could not recognize either of them.
