FIGHTING AMONG THEMSELVES.

New York, April 29—A special to the Herald from Corinto, Nicaragua, says: Taking advantage of the uneasiness that is manifesting itself throughout the Nicaragua republic in consequence of the occupation of Corinto, the Opposition party is making an attempt to overthrow the present Administration by force of arms. The Government is aware of the scheme, and is adopting measures to nip it. Martial law has been proclaimed and recruits are being enrolled.

Business at Corinto is paralyzed. The custom house and the postoffice remain closed. The foreigners resident here say the Government will soon come to terms. It is rumored that Nicaragua's action in this affair was prompted by advice received from Washington Minister Guzman.

It has been said that the British consul at Managua has been handed his passport. San Juan Del Sur announces that the British warship Wild Swan has arrived there.

THE ENGLISH PUZZLED.

The English appear to be puzzled how to act. There is reason to believe that they will retaliate for the closing of the port of Corinto by blockading San Juan Del Sur, Greytown and Bluefields. The running of all trains is suspended, and Corinto is practically in a state of siege. No one is allowed to bring provisions into the neighborhood, and supplies are running short. The night passed over quietly, two patrols composed of foreigners and marines guarding the town. The British are organizing their Government. An officer of the Royal Arthur says that the next two days will decide whether the British shall occupy more territory, including Paso de Caballos, or withdraw altogether, as important telegrams are expected from England.

—At this morning's Police Court there was only one prisoner, and he was more fit for a hospital or home for incurables than for a prison. Alex. Jackson was the fellow's name, and as he glanced between the bars of the cage he presented a deplorable picture. Jackson is so badly crippled up that he can only move about with the assistance of two canes. He tries to make a living by selling lead pencils and notepaper, but lately he has been in the hospital. He was discharged from the institution on Friday and went to a coffee house on the market for board. On Saturday he had no money to square his account, and the proprietor, Robert Charlton, kept his stock of pencils, etc. Jackson returned yesterday to get some clothes he had left, but Charlton refused to give them up. Jackson got mad, and to get even smashed several windows. Police Magistrate Parke took a lenient view of the case, and discharged the prisoner, and will endeavor to get him taken into a charitable institution. Jackson formerly belonged to Woodstock, but came to London when his mother died. He receives assistance from a sister in Owen Sound.

REV. W. W. WYLLIE'S CASE.
A Kingston dispatch of Saturday's date says: The case of the Rev. Mr. Wye against the sentence of the Bishop of Huron was continued today. The whole of the sitting was occupied by Mr. Marsh counsel for the appellant. The court indicated that in its opinion the question to be considered by it was not in regard to the offenses charged against Mr. Wye, but whether it appeared that his usefulness in the parish was gone.

CLOSE SEASON FOR FISH.
The Ottawa Fisheries Department has issued notices regarding the close season for fish. Bass cannot be caught or sold between May 10 and June 30; maskinonge, from April 15 to June 15; pickerel, from April 15 to May 15; speckled trout, from Sept. 15 to Nov. 30. The use of firearms, explosives or snares to catch or kill fish is prohibited. Persons convicted of breaking the law will be subject to a fine or imprisonment, and all informers receive half the fine imposed.

CARRIAGES SCORCHED.
Fire was discovered at 8:50 on Saturday evening in the upper portion of L. W. Crawford's carriage factory, Wellington street, near Bathurst. The fire started in the finishing room, badly damaged the carriage below, and burned material on which the flames fed caused them to make a good deal of headway by the time the brigade arrived. It had probably been smoldering and burning for some time before it was discovered. Before the fire was got under control the floor was burned through, and the embers, dropping on to several finished carriages below, badly damaged them also. The loss to building and stock will amount to \$400 and is covered by insurance. The brigade had another run yesterday afternoon, turning chimney at the residence of Mr. William Hunter, 132 Rectory street.

CHEERED THEIR DEPARTING MATES
When the train conveying the majority of the car shop employees who have been transferred to Toronto, pulled out of the East End station at 8:15 this morning all the men remaining at the shops assembled along the fence and track and gave them a parting salute of cheers that could be heard to Dundas street. The men on the train cheered back in a feeble manner as if they were not in the most cheery mood. They then men have gone to Toronto so far, and there will be a little less than was at first anticipated. Capt. Kerr, the superintendent here, has gone to Brantford and assumed his old position, Mr. Welsh, the Brantford superintendent, going to Toronto.

AGAINST THE COLLEGE SITE.
The medical men of the city, in response to letters sent out by the Hospital Trust, have reported adversely on the question of utilizing the Hellmuth College building for hospital purposes. Among the replies received by the board not one was absolutely in support of the proposition. The distance was one objection, the cost of proper sewerage connection another, and even with an electric system the cost of transportation to poor people would be considerable. It might also keep the doctors from attending daily as they do now. The medical men who recommended that improvements should be made to the present hospital, and that the old site should continue to be used, were in the majority, and included Doctors English, Meek, Annot, Gardner, Woodruff, Niven and Ferguson. Those who favored a new site and new building were Doctors Drake, Rooome and Moorhouse.

TO ASSIST HURON COLLEGE.
Mrs. Boomer, widow of the late Dean Boomer, has addressed an open letter to the alumni of Huron College, the presidents and members of parochial and other organizations of layworkers, and to all members of the Church of England in the diocese of Huron, asking for assistance to Huron College. The bishop has strongly endorsed the praiseworthy effort of Mrs. Boomer, and a letter to the clergy of the diocese says: "Owing to the extension of the building, which involved a heavy outlay, our funds have lately become wholly inadequate to meet our ordinary expenses. I therefore trust her appeal for a college which, under the blessing of God, has accomplished much good, will meet with a hearty and vigorous response. I shall be much pleased if you will kindly do all in your power to help on the above necessary work, not only by your personal efforts, but also by advocating the claims of the college before those who may be ignorant of the anxious position in which it is now placed."
