No, we cannot call that clever dipiomacy, because it assumes that other people are fools. They may be fools sometimes, but not always, and certainly not when you have waked them up with such a rude shock. We do not know what the final settlement will (be, but we know that there is no such thing as going back, and we know that the British Empire will brace itself to face the world and do its duty. We are not going to make such enormous sacrifices and then allow those who have done nothing to come in and dictate the terms of peace. Those who managed the Boer oligarchy have run It on to the rocks, and they have forfeited their position, and whatever the settlement may be, it will likely relieve them of any further responsibility. They had their chance in Africa and might have co-operated for the common good, but there is now no going

This year the movement has already begun most favorably, and from almost all the border States east as far as Ohio large numbers are reported to be meditating coming to Canada.

The day of the Dominion has come. Henceforth our progress as a nation is likely to be rapid. The prosperity of our people is assured.
