# The Question Preparing to Give Battle

# What Buller Is Supposed To Be Doing in Natal

Lord Roberts Has Had 20,000 Fresh Troops to Dispose of Since the Spion Kop Fight-Gen. Macdonald Making an Important Movement at Magersfontein.

Boers Attack a Party of British Soldiers in Their Trenches -Cannonading Going on at Ladysmith-Gen. French Shells a Boer Laager-Troops Reaching Cape Town Sent at Once to the Front.

London, Feb. 7.-In the absence of covered that some members of the war news this morning, Mr. Spencer Wilkinson, in the Morning Post, discusses the problem of arming the nation at home. He says: "There is now such intense and widespread interest in the army and its management that the nation has itself to thank if the solving of the problem should not be in the history of the next few months." proceeds to argue that "conscription would be valueless," unless the "general management of the army were first remodeled." On this point he says: \*A war office that for 30 years has not known what to do with the volunteers would not know what to do with half a million conscripts." He also discusses the use of the bayonet, remarking: "This weapon very seldom comes into actual use. Its effect is on the spirits of both sides, rather

than on the bodies of either." NO WORD FROM BULLER. Not a word has been received from the correspondents with Gen. Buller for three days. It is as though Natal had been wiped off the map, excepting in the heliogram from Ladysmith, saying that the Boers are cannonad-

ing and that "fighting" is going on. IMPORTANT MOVE. London, Feb. 7. - Gen. MacDonald. with 4,000 infantry, cavalry and artillery, threatens the Boer right at Magersfontein. This is the first sign of activity on the part of Lord Methuen for some weeks, and doubtless is in relation to the movements of the

British further east. The Standard has received the following dispatch, dated Monday, Feb. 5, from Koppie's Dam: "Gen. Mac-Donald, with a brigade of infantry, a regiment of Lancers and one battery, has reached here from Modder River Camp, in what is regarded as an important movement to the right of the Boer position at Magersfontein. Koppie's Dam commands the roads from Kimberley to Hopetown and Douglas. The two Boer laagers at Kamul Hoek and Griquatown are within striking distance. within striking distance. The arrival of Gen. MacDonald's column was opportune, as it just prevented two commandos effecting a junction. He now holds both banks of the river. Our Lancers had two brushes with the Boer patrols. There is great activity among the enemy, and strong forces are concentrating to oppose our further advance. The troops suffered from heat and scarcity of water dur-

ing the march." A BOER ATTACK. Modder Spruit, Monday, Feb. 6 .- On Saturday the Pretoria corps discovered a party of British, from Ladysmith, entrenched at a railroad bridge, protecting a number of coolies, who were cutting grass. A party of Boers dispatched to the scene was attacked in the trenches, and all retreated except four, who permitted the British to advance within 50 yards, when they fired a volley, killing three men. This was seen from the British fort, which fired a shell and sent cavalry to assist the British. The Boers beat these back, killing two men.

Modder Spruit, Feb. 6.—Messages from Ladysmith, dated yesterday, 5, say continuous cannonading had been proceeding since 5 o'clock in the morning, with the occasional roar of a Long Tom. The firing, it is added,

FRENCH SHELLS A LAAGER. London, Feb. 6.—A cable from Rens-berg says: Gen. French is holding in check a large force of Boers at Coles-berg. This morning a new Boer laager, near Slingersfontein, where the burghers were placing new artillery, was shelled with lyddite. The effect of the shelling was to spoil all the work that had been already accomplished, and to compel a general retirement of the Boers.

London, Feb. 7-4 a.m.-Lord Roberts has caused to be distributed in the towns bordering upon the invaded colonial territory an invitation to go into the desert, offering them good treatment and a restoration of their farms on the British occupation of republican territory. The manifesto
