Fighting for Fifteen Days

And Hemmed in by Masses of Chinese.

Gallant Resistance and Relief of Admiral Seymour—On Quarter Rations for Ten Days—Could Have Held Out Only Two Days Longer—Fate of the Pekin Legations in Doubt—The American Admiral To Be Recalled.

London, Friday, June 29—4 a.m.—The casualties of the international force attacking Tien Tsin were as follows:

Americans—Killed, 3; wounded, 2.
British—Killed, 2; wounded, 1.
Germans—Killed, 15; wounded, 27.
Russians—Killed, 10; wounded, 27.

The gun fire of the Americans and British is described as beautiful. After the relieving force pushed on to relieve Admiral Seymour, Chinese regulars, under Gen. Nieh, says a dispatch from Shanghai, again attacked Tien Tsin fiercely, and bombarded the foreign settlement with a terrible fire.

Col. Dordard (British) commanded the column that relieved Admiral Seymour. American marines participated in the achievement. The admiral was found entrenched and surrounded by immense masses of Chinese, who were driven off by the relieving column after a brisk fight. His men had made a brilliant resistance, never failing in courage.

FIFTEEN DAYS OF CONTINUOUS FIGHTING.
During ten days the men were on quarter rations. They started with provisions for ten days, and they could have held out a day or two longer. The column was a few miles beyond Lofa.

Deciding it hopeless to attempt to break through the hordes, Admiral Seymour essayed a night retreat toward Tien Tsin, but he came into collision with a strong force of Chinese arriving from the northwest, and could neither advance nor retreat. There was nothing to do but entrench and to

STAND A SIEGE.
He vainly attempted the heroic communication. Seymour's men caught several Chinese, who said the legations had been burned and the ministers killed. Others said that the ministers had been imprisoned. The Chinese displayed fanatical courage in the attack.

Four thousand Russians left Tien Tsin four days after Admiral Seymour, but they never got in touch with him. Railway communication from Taku to Tien Tsin has been restored, and the foreign legations in the south part of the city are in communication with the same.

THE LEGATIONS.
The fate of the members of the legations is still a mystery. From official sources it is learned that the legations at Pekin and the foreigners there were safe on June 25. Washington, June 28, says the department this afternoon and exhibited the following cablegram to Secretary Hay:

"Canton, June 28.—The legation ministers having left Pekin, are now fifteen miles from Tien Tsin, with Admiral Seymour. (Signed) Li Hung Chang."

London, June 28—7 p.m.—The Viceroy of Nanking has telegraphed to the British consul-general at Shanghai that he had received June 25, an imperial rescript as follows: "The foreign legations at Pekin continue, as usual, to receive every protection from the imperial government." On the other hand, officials of the Chinese embassy say they have reason to believe the foreign ministers at Pekin were given their passports June 19.

The foreign office is much concerned at the latter report.

London, June 28.—In the House of Lords today, the premier, Lord Salisbury, referring to the relief of Vice-Admiral Seymour, said he knew nothing of the position of Sir Claude MacDonald, the British minister to China, or of the members of the other legations in that country. He thought, however, there was ground for hoping that no violence had been done them, but even that, he added, could only be stated hypothetically.

In the House of Commons Mr. Brodrick said the government had no news of the legations.

TALK OF "SUPPRESSING" THE BOXERS.
London, July 29.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, wiring at 9:05 p.m., yesterday, says: It is reported on good Chinese authority that the government, alarmed by the foreign military preparations, has issued an edict ordering the peremptory suppression of the Boxers and announcing a decision to protect the legations at all hazards. However, this may be, the British consul at Shanghai received definite information yesterday, the Daily Express correspondent says, that, while solemnly promising complete abstention from warlike preparations, the Chinese mounted several new 6-inch guns at the Woo Sung forts.

Bethlehem, Pa., June 29.—The government has placed an order with the Bethlehem Steel Company for guns, including, it is said, seven 10-inch and four 12-inch breech-loading rifles, fourteen 12-inch mortars, and other smaller ones for immediate dispatch to the Orient.

MERELY MENTIONED

Drought has terribly damaged crops in Salt River Valley, Arizona.

Martin J. Russell, editor of the Chicago Chronicle, died at Mackinac.

Mr. Duncan Rose, the well-known Nova Scotia railway contractor, died in Montreal.

Lilly Brock, aged eighteen, committed suicide at Grana by drowning herself in the Pembina River.

Col. A. T. Biles was nominated for governor of Michigan by the Republican convention on the nineteenth ballot.

David Bell, formerly one of the best known lumbermen of Canada, is dead at his home in New York, aged 79 years.

Herbert Searrow, a young man from Bradford, England, was caught by a New York while working in a field near Mowseman and died of his injuries a few hours later.

Early Thursday morning, at Beamsville, a blaze was discovered in the storehouse in the rear of Beatty's vacant store. It destroyed the warehouse, and destroyed the house.

Around the body of Patrick Brogan, a section man killed at Clinton, Iowa, by a Northwestern train, was a belt containing \$40 in gold and 20 rare old coins. Brogan's home and relatives are unknown.

There was a large and fashionable gathering at St. Thomas' Church, Toronto, Wednesday, when Capt. Alexander D. Cartwright, son of Sir Richard, and Miss Ada Hart, daughter of Mrs. Hart, of Harbor street, were united in marriage.

The Chicago Tribune says Puggill, Tom Sharkey and Mrs. Lillian Bauer, a widow of a well-known Chicago saloon keeper, will be married next week. Sharkey met Mrs. Bauer while in Chicago this spring.

At Kingston, Ont., on Wednesday, Miss Lizzie Hamilton, daughter of Clark Hamilton, collector of customs, and granddaughter of the late Hon. John Hamilton, was married to Edward J. B. Pense, proprietor of the Kingston British Whig.

The Conservatives of Peel held a convention at Brampton on Thursday to nominate a candidate to oppose Jos. Featherstone, M.P., in the election for the House of Commons. Richard Blaine, of Belleville, was chosen.

Plans have been completed for the building of the Imperial Cotton Company at Hamilton. When in operation it is expected that the plant will give employment to between three and four hundred hands. Heavy cotton goods of various kinds will be manufactured.

Thursday's fire at Corbyville was under control at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, mainly by the efforts of the Belleville firemen. Ripley Palmer Hotel was burned, loss \$2,000. Mrs. Nancy Palmer's residence, and a house owned by her, and tenanted by Richard Foxton, are a total loss. R. P. White's house was destroyed.

The Eddy-Bessey litigation, which has been before the courts for years, is ended. The terms of the settlement involve the payment by Mr. Eddy to his daughter, Mrs. Bessey, of a sum of money between \$34,000 and \$35,000, and an agreement regarding the management of Mrs. Bessey's property.
