THE COMING ELECTION.

South Oxford Liberals Renominate Dr. McKay.

Halton Reformers Put a New Candidate in the Field - General Political News.

MILTON, Ont., March 9 .- The Halton Liberals met here in convention to-day to nominate a candidate for the Local House, and John Husband, of Trafalgar, exwarden of the county, received the hearty and unanimous nomination. Hon. John Dryden, Minister of Agriculture, was present and gave a very pleasant and practical address.

SOUTH OXFORD'S CHOICE. INGERSOLL, Ont., March 9.-The Liberals of the south riding of Oxford met in convention at Mount Elgin for the purpose of nominating a candidate for the Legislative Assembly. The attendance was one of the largest and most enthusiastic ever seen in this riding. Nearly 200 delegates were present, every polling subdivision being represented. The names of a number of prominent Liberals were presented, but all withdrew in favor of Dr. McKay, the present member, whose nomination was made unanimous.

At a recent meeting of the executive of the South Perth Reform Association, a call was issued for a convention to be held in St. Marys on Saturday, March 17, to nominate a candidate for the Legislature. North Wentworth Patrons met yester-

day, and, Mr. R. L. Biggs having declined to be their candidate, Mr. John Nicholson, reeve of East Flamboro, was nominated.

Nominations took place Thursday in Nova Scotia for the Provincial elections, which take place next Thursday. The Patrons of Industry for North Hastings met at Madoc Thursday and nominated Jas. English, of Madoc town-

ship, for the Commons, and Jas. McComb,

of Rawdon for the Legislature. THE VIENNA HOMICIDE.

Travis Tried for Manslaughter and

Acquitted. Sr. Thomas, March 9.—Atthe assizes here Wm. Travis was arraigned yesterday for trial on the charge of manslaughter. On Oct. 26, 1893, the prisoner killed Wm. Hodgson in a bar-room fight in the Rossin House, Vienna. The day was a rainy one, and a number had gathered in the barroom. The prisoner, it appears, was acting a peacemaker. He was on top of and holding deceased's brother. The deceased struck prisoner. Afterwards the deceased and prisoner came together. The prisoner kicked the deceased, causing a rupture which resulted in death the following Monday. The jury after half an hour's deliberation to-day returned a verdict of not guilty.

THE WHISKY COMMISSION. Clergymen Who Are Not Prohibitionists

Give Their Views. OTTAWA, March 9.—The Dominion Government's whisky commission held a ses-

sion in the city hall to-day. Archbishop Duhamel on being examined said he was not a prohibitionist, but was in favor of temperance measures, and wished to see the existing law bet

Rural Dean Bogart was opposed to prohibition, but favored temperance. Chief of Police McVeitty gave statistics to show that drunkenness was on the decrease in the city. There were only half the number of cases in the police court now than there were four years ago.

OTTAWA, Ont., March 9 .- The funeral of the late Lord Tweedmouth (the father of her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen) was arranged to take place at noon to-day in London, England. At the same hour a memorial service, attended by their Excellencies and the whole of their staff and household, was held in the Governor-Generals private chapel at Government House.
