GOVERNMENT DEFENDED. War Secretary Brodrick, who followed, declared that the terms offered the Boers were better than those offered to a vanquished enemy. Lord Kitchener's mounted forces by 20,000 men.

WAR HORSES PURCHASED. London, Feb. 20.—Lord Stanley, the financial secretary to the war office, has announced that the government has purchased 113,950 horses in Great Britain and \$1,784 elsewhere. The English and the Irish horses proved the best, and the American were next. Of the latter, 21,000 were purchased, while Canada supplied 2,750.

The war office publishes the list of British casualties in the fight between Smith-Dorrien and Commandant Gen. Louis Botha at Bothwell Feb. 6, already fully described in Lord Kitchener's dispatches. The British casualties were 24 killed and 53 wounded and the Boers were repulsed.

It was Gen. Froneman and not Gen. De Wet who captured a British train near Springfield last week. It is stated that Gen. De Wet expresses his intention of commanding all the Dutch colonists under penalty of death.

BOER LEADER URGES SURRENDER. The Pretoria correspondent of the London Standard says it is reported that Gen. Schalkburg is doing his utmost to induce a general surrender of the Boers in the northern part of the Transvaal.

A Cape Town dispatch says: The military authorities have thrown up entrenchments at Somerset East and Uitenhage to guard against attacks by the Boer invaders.

The circulation of the Dublin Weekly Freeman and the London Morning Post has been prohibited in the Croydon district. The military authorities have given notice that any persons found with the prohibited newspapers in their possession will be liable to punishment.

ALLEGED TRIPARTITE AGREEMENT. Dispatches from Lisbon assert that during the recent meeting in London of King Edward, Emperor William and King Charles, an arrangement was made for the partition of Africa.

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PROCLAMATION IS PREPARED!

Setting Forth the Government's Intentions Regarding South African Colonies.

Denial of the Story That Boers Captured in Khaki Uniform Are To Be Shot—General Surrender Urged by a Boer Leader—Reception of Strathcona's in London.

London, Feb. 19.—In the House of Commons yesterday, War Secretary Brodrick gave an official denial of the story that orders had been issued that all Boers captured in khaki uniforms were to be shot.

A PROCLAMATION. Colonial Secretary Chamberlain informed the house that a proclamation setting forth the intentions of the government in the administration of the new South African colonies had already been drafted, but had not been issued, in deference to the opinion of General Kitchener and Sir Alfred Milner, that the time was not yet opportune.

SCORED CHAMBERLAIN. 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Revolt of the Tories

More Serious Than Revealed by the Figures.

Stormy Time for the Atlantic Liners—London Under a Fog—General Cable Notes.

London, Feb. 19.—The revolt of the Tories," as the Daily Graphic calls it, is believed to have been more serious even than was revealed by the figures of the division. Several Conservatives asserted afterward that they were sorely tempted to vote against the government, but held back owing to feelings of loyalty to the ministry.

The same spirit actuates the editorials in the government papers, this morning in defending the cabinet. The Liberal journals, however, are jubilant over the discomfiture of the government, and do not conceal the fact that resentment against the predominance of the Cecil family in the cabinet has much to do with it.

At a meeting of the Irish members of the House of Commons yesterday, the question of the cabinet was discussed by the party heretofore to pair with either Liberals or Conservatives.

The members of the cabinet and the leader of the opposition met at the foreign office this afternoon to discuss the question of the civil list, Lord Salisbury being desirous of communicating the government proposals to Lord Salisbury, Liberal leader, in the House of Lords, to Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, Liberal leader in the House of Commons, so that when the question shall be introduced, the debate will not be unduly prolonged.

Another joint meeting will be held to further consider the matter.

STORMY TIME FOR STEAMERS. Queenstown, Feb. 19.—Arriving steamers continue to report having encountered storms on the Atlantic. The British steamer Lord Kelvin reports having had a fearful voyage. She experienced terrific easterly gales for fifteen days, and her coal supply became exhausted, and was forced to burn portions of her cargo for several days. Almost throughout the voyage the weather was the worst ever experienced by all on board.

LONDON UNDER A FOG. London, Feb. 19.—A dense fog enveloped London this morning, impeding all traffic and caused a number of accidents, the most serious of which was a rear-end collision on the underground railway, as a result of which half a dozen persons received injuries which necessitated their removal to a hospital.

DUKE PASSED HIS EXAM. Potsdam, Feb. 19.—The young Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha has passed his examination for the rank of military ensign. His work was qualified as "good" by the examiners.

CABLE NOTES. The fire on the Hamburg-American Line steamer Graf Waldersee has been extinguished. The damage was slight. The semi-official Trade and Industry Gazette, of St. Petersburg, contends that Russo-American relations have been so friendly that the present
