He repudiated the suggestion that the opposition favored undoing the annexation of the two re-publics, but he said a settlement would not be accelerated by truculent language, but by the combination of a strong army capable of commanding respect and terms not derogatory to either the victe or the vanquished.

THEY AGREE TO THE TERMS

Chinese Plenipotentiaries Communicate With the Powers.

Want a Couple of Condemned Officials Saved-But Ministers Insist on Former Demands.

Pekin, Feb. 20 .- The foreign envoys today received an official communication from the Chinese plenipotentiaries offering to agree to all the terms of List of Census Enumerators Recommended the powers. If our Pekin news is correct, the foreign envoys will have a curious experience in discovering that the most important feature of the negotiations has been settled by an expedient of which they were unaware.
