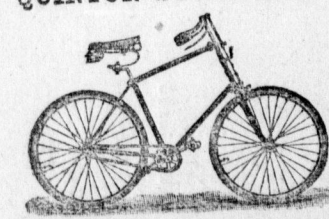

TWO DAYS IN HISTORY.

June 25.

70—Vespasian, emperor of Rome, died and was quietly succeeded by his son Titus.

1218—Simon de Montfort, the elder, was slain.

1230—Confession of Augsburg, drawn by Luther, Melancthon and others, presented to Charles V and read to the German diet.

1807—Napoleon Bonaparte met Alexander of Russia on a raft at Tilsit to make peace.

1841—Alexander Macomb, soldier, hero of Plattsburg, died in Washington, born 1782.

1870—General George A. Custer and 277 men of his command were massacred by the Sioux on the Little Big Horn river, Montana.

1887—Cass Pratt, a noted American traveler, died at Boston, aged 78. James Speed, ex-United States attorney general, died aged 73.

1888—Sidney Howard Gay, journalist and author, died on Staten Island; born 1814.

1891—The noted Parnell married Mrs. O'Shea, whose divorce he had caused.

800—The Roman army disastrously defeated by the Persians near the Tigris river and the Emperor Julian killed.

1279—Pope Innocent V died.

1564—Francisco Pizarro, Spanish conqueror of Peru, was assassinated in Lima.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Judge Street, wife and daughter, are on a European trip.

—Great fishing at Port Stanley Saturday. So a number of citizens say.

—Dr. and Mrs. Beumer, of the asylum, have returned from the World's Fair.

—The steamer Joe Milton took 50 passengers to Cleveland from Port Stanley Saturday.

—Rev. Dr. Antliff, of this city, preached in the Alma College Chapel, St. Thomas, yesterday.

—Miss Emma Arthurs, of Bolton, Ont., who has been visiting friends in London, has returned home.

—The Bishop of Huron conducted confirmation services at St. George's Church, Saratoga, yesterday.

—The brand new street sign for Langarth street, South London, is misplaced. It reads "Langrath." The residents would like it corrected.

—Wm. Forsythe, a C. P. R. switchman, had two fingers badly crushed yesterday while coupling an engine in the yards here.

—Among the cases decided in the Supreme Court at Ottawa on Saturday was London vs. Watt & Son, dismissed with costs.

—Charles Gannon, Frederick Brown and John Young, three young men, were arrested at the camp yesterday on a charge of disorderly conduct.

—Citizens have good occasion to visit the camp to-night. A concert will be given by a band in camp. The street railway will provide good service.

—Tassie Pope, a young woman, and Fred Watson, found together on Maple avenue yesterday morning, were arrested, charged with being disorderly.

—John Donohue, who keeps the hotel just opposite the asylum, was fined \$20 and costs by Squire J. B. Smyth on Saturday for infraction of the liquor license law.

—John Benson, Fred Hiers and a couple of other youths were before Squire Jarvis on Saturday, charged with swimming in the river. They were let go with a warning.

—Wm. Dykes comes up before Squire Jarvis to-day on a charge of unlawfully entering eleven acres of land on the north side of Main street, Moss. James Dykes is the complainant.

—Yesterday afternoon Mr. Caldwell addressed the Adelaide Street Baptist Bible school on temperance. The gentlemen's remarks were highly interesting and the attendance was large.

—Rev. Thomas Cullen, the new minister of Askin Street Methodist Church, preached for the first time in that edifice at both services yesterday. He has an easy and attractive mode of discourse. His efforts were much appreciated by large congregations.

—The annual outing of the employees of the Free Press and the London Printing and Lithographing Company was held on Saturday at Niagara Falls. The G. T. R. provided excellent accommodation, and the 250 odd excursionists had a very pleasant time.

—The annual flower service in connection with Christ Church Sunday school was held yesterday. The children brought handsome bouquets and placed them in the channel. Rev. A. H. Rhodes delivered an appropriate address on the subject of flowers. Canon Smith, the rector, presented prizes to the scholars who had earned them. After the service the teachers conveyed the floral contributions to the hospital. They were distributed among the patients.

—There was a charivari at Wm. Leslie's place, lot 8, con. 7, Delaware, on Tuesday and Wednesday night. Some boys and men, not content with firing revolvers, beating tin cans and otherwise misconducting themselves, undertook to ride the object of their dislike (Mrs. Leslie) on a

rail, which they shoved through a bedroom window. Mr. Leslie complained to the authorities, and as a result two neighbors, named John Crouse and Robert Munce, were arrested by Detective Graham on Saturday. They were bailed pending an examination.

—Rev. Mr. Godwin, late of London West, has been very cordially received by his congregation at Walkerville. At his reception the church was completely filled. Rev. G. W. Henderson occupied the chair. In a short and appropriate speech he welcomed Rev. Mr. Godwin, who made a suitable reply. He expressed pleasure at leaving his old field of labor in London West and his friends there. But as he found so many of his old London friends here in his new appointment, he already felt at home.

Port Stanley and Cleveland.

The following is from Sunday's Detroit Free Press: "Capt. Grummond has decided to place the sidewheel passenger steamer Flora on the Cleveland and Port Stanley route, making a trip every other night, giving excursions out of Cleveland and Port Stanley in the daytime. The Flora will make connections at Cleveland with the steamers of Grummond's Mackinac Line and through tickets will be issued to Mackinac Island, Chicago and the World's Fair via Lake Michigan steamers. The Flora will leave here next Wednesday evening for Cleveland, taking passengers at the reduced rate of \$1.50 from Detroit to Cleveland, including berth. Passengers going down on the Flora can return on the steamer State of Michigan, leaving here Thursday evening and returning from Cleveland Friday evening. The steamer Flora will be officered as follows: William A. F. Gardiner, chief engineer; Captain Campbell, clerk; Howard Weeks, first mate; John A. Miller, steward; William Elliott, Port Stanley people have arranged to give short excursions on the Flora on Dominion Day, and on the evening of that day a large excursion to Cleveland."

City Assessors Appointed.

The appointment of the two city assessors is made at the sweet pleasure of the mayor and the assessment commissioner. They met the other day and quietly appointed these officials for the ensuing year. Mr. Peter Toll will again cover wards 4 and 5, and Mr. Alf. McCoubrey will replace Mr. W. Westcott in wards 3 and 6. The latter was popular and efficient, and much surprise is expressed at his removal.

AN INTERESTING OCCASION.

Addresses to Wm. Bowman and Wm. Lewis by the Dundas Street Methodist Church Sunday School.

The anniversary of the Dundas Street Center Methodist Church Sunday School was commemorated yesterday by special services—morning, afternoon and evening.

The children in large numbers occupied the galleries at the church services and assisted in the singing. Rev. Joseph Philip, minister in the morning, and the pastor, Rev. Dr. Antliff, in the evening. Great interest centered in the open session of the Sunday school in the afternoon. The attendance of children, their relatives and friends was large. Pleasant addresses were made by Rev. W. J. Clark and Rev. R. Aylward, and there was also special singing.

Two addresses were presented to retiring officials—one to Mr. William Lewis, leader of the singing, who has resigned that position, and the other to Mr. William Bowman, ex-superintendent. They were both signed by J. Cooper Antliff, D.D., minister; D. A. McDermid, superintendent; J. W. Noble, secretary; and I. M. Mayell, teacher Bible class.

That to Mr. Lewis spoke of the untiring devotion manifest by him to the important department of Christian service under his charge, and ventured to hope that this school would still have the benefit of his sympathy and assistance.

The address to Mr. Bowman congratulated him on his earnest work in London, Eng., in Hamilton, and in this city. It alluded to the beneficent influence which he had exerted over hundreds of young people connected with the school, not a few of whom were now filling positions of influence and responsibility in different parts of the Dominion.
