Sunday School Teachers' Yearly Meeting—Presentation to C. G. Moorhead.

The annual meeting of the teachers and officers of the Adelaide Street Baptist Sunday School was held last night in the lecture-room of the church, and was largely attended. Among those present were Pastor T. T. Shields, D. H. Gillies, Fred J. Reed, John Hieslop, C. W. Vansickle, C. F. Maynard and the staff of lady teachers and officers of the school. The chair was occupied by Mr. D. H. Gillies, assistant superintendent, who made reference to the general working of the school and the advancement made from year to year.

The chairman then called on Mr. Charles G. Moorhead, secretary and treasurer, for his annual report, which was comprehensive in detail, giving the average attendance at 200 per Sunday, and the amount raised at \$171.79; expenditure, \$109.29; balance on hand, \$62.50. Mr. Moorhead referred to the fact that he had completed nineteen years in the capacity of secretary and treasurer of the school, a position, which, owing to ill-health, he would now have to resign.

In tendering his resignation, Mr. Moorhead said he fully appreciated the honor conferred upon him as caretaker of the school funds for so many years. During the past few years, he had been and gone over a hundred teachers and officers had been connected with the school. "I have endeavored," said Mr. Moorhead, "in my feeble way to promote the welfare of the school, and to have it up-to-date in every particular. I retire with utmost love for my associates, and I wish to thank one and all for their assistance and kind consideration."

Following this, the Adelaide Street Baptist Sunday School met with still greater success in the future, and that the faithful work performed by its teachers will in due time reap its reward.

After the election of officers and just before partaking of tea, which had been provided by the ladies of the school, Mr. Fred Reed, on behalf of the teachers and officers of the school, read a kindly-written letter to Mr. Moorhead, and Mrs. Pierce presented Moorhead with a handsome gold watch, engraved, "From the Staff of Adelaide Street Baptist Sunday School, 1904." Following is the address: Mr. Charles G. Moorhead:

Dear Sir and Brother—In accepting your resignation as secretary and treasurer of the Adelaide Street Baptist Sunday School, the officers and teachers take this opportunity to express their appreciation of the faithful work you have performed during your nine-year period of service. 32ND ANNIVERSARY
OF FOREST CITY

Ancient Foresters' Court Marks the Occasion With a Social Gathering in Its Hall.

The thirty-second anniversary gathering of the Forest City, No. 5744, A. O. F., was held last night in the Foresters' Hall, East London, and was one of the most successful social events in the history of the court.

There are about three hundred members in the court at present and many of them were present with their wives. The evening was spent in a thoroughly enjoyable evening. Mr. Walter Richards presided, and after refreshments were served, he introduced a program of vocal and instrumental selections, to which Mr. Vanbuskirk, Mr. Hessel, Miss McLaren, Mr. Smith, Mr. Jones, Misses Faldino, Mr. W. Nelson and Mr. G. Gower contributed. During the evening the high chief, ranger, Bro. S. Kent, arrived unexpectedly, and gave an address on the progress of the order. The district chief, Bro. R. Jupp, also spoke along the same lines. While the speech was in progress a telegram was received from Dr. Ed Seaborn, one of the court physicians, now in Florida, congratulating the court on its anniversary.

There are some very interesting facts to be obtained from the history of the Forest City. During the 32 years of its existence, it has been paid out in benefits of different kinds, in the same time 44 members, 27 members have died, and 2 widows of deceased members have died. The total amount paid in funeral benefits was \$5,425.75, which was given directly for members. Twelve hundred and fifty dollars has been paid to members of the sick and funeral fund, and \$251.81 to the management fund, of this \$251.81 is invested in real estate, and at present there is \$340.43 in the hands of the treasurer. To Mr. Walter Richards, the secretary, a great deal of the credit must be given for the splendid standing of the court. In the past he has been secretary, and in that position he has won the confidence and respect of all the members. With him at present there is a very efficient list of officers, including P. C. R. PRIMROSE BACK IN
THE GAME AGAIN

Minstrel Could Not Content Himself Away From Stage Environments, He Says.

Monday night, George Primrose, once a bellboy in the Tecumseh House here, and who is now the king of minstrels, and with a cool million, returned to minstrelsy after a retirement of a year or so. For some time he has been filling vaudeville engagements on all the big circuits at a salary of \$1,000 a week, but now he is out on the road again at the head of a big minstrel aggregation which practically opened its season in Syracuse on Monday night. So far Primrose is not booked for London.

"I simply could not settle down and be contented away from stage environments," said Mr. Primrose to a Syracuse reporter. "When I left the stage I thought I would enjoy myself in recreation and travel, but those pursuits soon became monotonous. Every night I would be restless, and imagine for the moment that it was nearly time for my appearance at the theatre—which in a career of 30 years in the minstrelsy business had become second nature to me. Finally I decided that inasmuch as I had made my money on the burnt-cork stage I would devote the part of it to staging the most elaborate thing in pure minstrelsy the stage has ever seen, and I think the theater-going public will say I have done so."

Mr. Vanderbilt bought the horse from the owner, a farm in Port Chester, under the name of Harmony, and later christened him High Tide. Now, it is asserted that the horse really is King, winner of many prizes in previous years—a splendid animal.

Mr. Morgan had sent to Port Chester for a rest, the banker ordered his horse returned, and, not long ago, his daughter discovered that the returned horse was not King, but a far inferior one. King was identified later at the horse show by several persons, and it is understood that Mr. Morgan has demanded from the owner of the farm an explanation, and the return of his horse.

What stand Mr. Vanderbilt will take in the matter is not known. The horse has been in his possession some time.
